In a recent Philadelphia North American appears a cartoon entitled "The Shady Side of Her Family Tree," says the Sacramento Bee.

A young woman is holding a tryst with a dudish-looking young man, while in the shade of a neighboring tree stands an Irish laborer with a pipe in his hand, and by his side a patient, sad-faced wife.

The young woman is evidently ashamed of those beneath the tree, and her anxious glance shows she is afraid the insipid bit of humanity with her will look that way and see what she is evidently so determined he shall not see.

The cartoon tells its story eloquently. It is the old, old tale over again—the tale of a silly woman reveling in the fortune established by an honest, conscientious, and God-fearing laboring man, and trying to conceal the truth of her descent, as though, as though it were something at which she should blush.

On the contrary, she should be proud of it. The man to whose toil, and industry, and shrewdness, and financial ability, she and her father, and her father's father before, owe the foundation of their wealth—and to that wealth their position in a sycophantic society—was one whom men will ever respect if dukes and fashion plates do not. He was one, in comparison with whom the insipid non-intellect by her side is as mad to marble. The old laborer was of that hard old granite out of which the Lord God Almighty has hewn the characters and the souls of men who have blazed the path of civilization through wildernesses; who have wrested secrets from the bosom of Mother Earth; who have spanned continents with bands of steel, and wedded the ocean in polygamy's bonds to countless sails; men who have fought the battles of Humanity and Liberty, and have throttled Oppression even on the throne itself; men who have saved Nations and built commonwealths; men who, with the jewels which the exploring and sleepless mind have brought from the caves of experience and industry, have bought their ransom and their kin's ransom from "those twin goblins of the daring heart, low birth and iron fortunes;" men who, even if born on the mud floor of an Irish cabin, have steadfastly set their faces to the eternal stars, and, dying, have bequeathed to their descendants the records of honest and honorable lives; men not touched with the accolade by a sensual king—himself but the breath of yesterday—but men knighted in mankind's nobility by the great King of Kings.

He hath not forgotten the toil at the carpenter's bench, nor that his holy mother was busy with the household duties while he and Joseph worked for their daily bread.

The silly, rattle-headed, female fashion plates of today may be ashamed of the honest toilers from whom their families sprang, but he knoweth that the ones to blush for themselves should be the apish descendants, not the stalwart founders.

HERE AND THERE

The most widely known English writer in Japan is Carlyle.

A turtle weighing 1200 pounds, recently captured near Los Angeles, is said to be the largest ever known. The largest marine turtle previously captured was taken to London. It weighed 550 pounds and was known to have been over 80 years old. It was still growing at the time of its death.

Alexander Sutherland, the bugler who led the charge of the famous "light brigade" at Balaklava, is living in the city of Denver, Colo. He is 94 years of age, but has expressed a desire to attend the St. Louis fair, in response to an invitation received from the school children of that city.

The gypsies on their first appearance in England, about the beginning of the sixteenth century, were mistaken for Egyptians and so called by men of education, but the common people, finding some difficulty in mastering the name, rendered it "gypsies," and so the wandering people have ever since been called.

Two years ago the cancer research fund was established in England with about \$500,000 in hand, and with the Prince of Wales as president. The fund experts have just reported on their work for a year. They deny that civilization has brought about a spread of cancer. The disease, they say, pervades animals as well as human life.

Plans have just been completed by the Erie railroad for the introduction of a number of hospital or ambulance cars, with which to cope with the effects of collisions or other accidents. For over a year the railroad has been quietly experimenting with an ordinary car, fitted up according to the ideas of scientists, who were employed by the road.

NEW USE FOR AUTO-MOBILES

Government Will Experiment With Them for War Purposes

San Francisco, Aug. 9.—A new departure in automobiling is the motor car which arrived in this city on Thursday, for the use of the United States army. It is to be used during the coming maneuvers of the regular troops and the state militia under General McArthur at Henry ranch, San Luis Obispo county. Colonel Parker W. West left this city in this car yesterday afternoon, and will proceed in it to camp.

This is the first car of the kind used for military purposes in the United States, and was especially built for the army. During the maneuvers it will be put to an exhaustive test to determine its value during military operations in the field. It is to be used for the Signal Corps for rapid transportation across country, to make repairs, and to serve as a traveling telegraph office. It is also expected that it will be of great service to a commanding general, who can travel in it from point to point, inspecting the troops and being able at any moment to connect with military telegraph lines and to send and receive messages to and from any portion of his army.

The car is a twenty horse power Winton gasoline touring car, of 1904 pattern. It was chosen by the war department after a competitive test of a large number of designs, and it has been sent west to have its first practical test in California. It will carry easily from six to eight men; on the chauffeur's seat in front, and the others on the tonneau, where two seats are fixed vis-a-vis. The car is strongly built, and is both swift and commodious.

In the tonneau there is a folding table for the telegraph apparatus, and electric batteries are carried in suitable places. On each side of the car are racks for carrying flags, rockets and various tools used by the signal corps.

The car will carry among other equipments a post hole digger, hatchets, climbers and straps, brackets with their handles, insulators, a coil of wire and many other useful implements.

If the value of this car is demonstrated during the maneuvers the army will formally adopt the type and have a number of others built.

Big Shoot at West Baden.

West Baden, Ind., Aug. 9.—A large number of the crack professional and amateur shots of the country faced the traps here today at the opening of what promises to be the greatest trap shooting tournament of the season. Included among the professional present were Fred Gilbert, J. A. R. Elliot, Tom Marshall, W. R. Crosby, and Rollo Helkes. The tournament, which will last through the remainder of the week, is given under the auspices of "The Indians," an association of fifty of the most expert trap shots of the country.

His 104th Birthday.

Vandalia, Ill., Aug. 9.—Francis Binnon, who keeps a hotel in the little town of Vernon with the aid of his youngest daughter, today celebrated the 104th anniversary of his birth in the midst of a great gathering of his friends and relatives. His descendants number over one hundred and include nearly a dozen great-grandchildren. Mr. Binnon was born near Lynchburg, Va., Aug. 9, 1900. His father lived to be 104, and his grandfather, it is said, died by accident at the age of 110.

Knights of Fidelity Meeting.

Seymour, Ind., Aug. 9.—The grand lodge, Knights of Fidelity of Indiana, composed of retail liquor dealers, began its annual convention here today. Several hundred members are in attendance from various parts of the state. The convention, which will be in session two days, will consider measures looking to the further protection of those engaged in the saloon trade from the Prohibitionists and other organized antagonists of the liquor business.

Stamp Collectors Meet.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 9.—The American Philatelic association, which has a membership of 600 advanced collectors of stamps in the United States and Canada and a number in European and Asiatic countries, began its annual convention in Pittsburg today. The opening session was held in Carnegie hall this morning with the president, Alexander Holland of Brooklyn, in the chair.

Pension Report as Campaign Document.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.—In defense of President Roosevelt's famous pension order making age conclusive as to disability, the Republican campaign committee will, it is said, circulate hundreds of thousands of copies of Pension Commissioner Ware's report, which is now being printed. An endeavor will be made to show, it is said, that the result of the order was not a raid on the treasury, but the making smooth of the path of deserving veterans. Advance figures from the report show that between April 13, the date on which the order went into force, and June 30 the end of the fiscal year, there were 3859 original pensions granted under this order, and 14,786 increased. About 30,000 applications were pending on June 30.

Delaware Republicans.

Dover, Del., Aug. 9.—There appears to be a strong possibility that the two factions of the Republican party in Delaware may unite on a state ticket to be voted for at the coming election. The regular Republicans are holding their state convention here today and it is probable that the Adickes faction will be asked to ratify the ticket named, some concessions to be made by both sides in regard to candidates. L. Heisler Ball, chairman of the state committee, may be decided on as the compromise candidate for governor.
