Portland, Aug. 11.—Henny Weinhard, the millionaire brewer, has been threatened with death if he does not yield up \$2000, by a person whose identity the police have not yet ascertained. The letter addressed to him was received Monday night, by Paul Weinhard, the manager of Mr. Weinhard's business interests, as the brewer is now at Seaside.

After arming himself as a precaution against attack, Mr. Weinhard turned the letter over to the police. In it the writer declared that Mr. Weinhard has more money than he needs and must give \$2000 to him in order that he may complete a house he is building, or pay for his failure to do so with his life. The writer also declared that he would kill Mr. Weinhard.

As soon as the letter was turned over to the police City Detective Kerrigan was detailed to endeavor to discover the identity of the author if possible and place him under arrest. Owing to the reticence of the authorities minor details cannot be learned. They refuse to say whether or not the letter is signed and whether its author stated how and when the money be turned over to him.

One theory is that the man is insane. Whether this be true or not, the police are convinced that it is dangerous for him to be at large. In order not to alarm Mr. Weinhard unnecessarily no word concerning the letter has yet been sent him.

Six Weeks' Campaign in New York.

New York, Aug. 11.—Pursuant to the call of Chairman Odell the Republican state committee went into session at the Fifth Avenue Hotel this afternoon for the purpose of fixing a date and place for the holding of the Republican state convention. It is expected that the committee will select the second week in September as the time for the state convention. During that week the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the Republican party is to occur, and that fact is urged as one of the reasons for the holding of the convention at that time. If the Republicans choose that week the Democrats, it is understood, will choose the week following. This would permit a six weeks' campaign in New York, which leaders on both sides are inclined to think would be long enough.

POPULAR STOCK FOOD

The Salem Flouring Mills company has installed a new barley flaker, with a capacity of three tons an hour. The flaker is the latest improved Nordolce and Mormon pattern and has been pronounced a great success where ever tried. The process of flaking barley and oats for stock food has been the subject of many experiments, but with the present machinery it is easy to accomplish.

The grain passes through a cylinder, and when it reaches the flaker it is converted into a flat mass, very palatable and far superior to ground or chopped feed where sharp pieces make it difficult for stock to digest.

The cylinder is filled with steam and the grain is fed through with considerable rapidity, yet is softened sufficiently to make it elastic and in perfect condition to flake. Heretofore small machines have been used and the delay in procuring the flaker grain was so long, that heavy feeders were loath to adopt it, realizing however that it is far superior to whole grain for feeding purposes.

The saving in feed is from one-third to one-half and flaked grain is taking the place of other feed almost entirely in the East. The time consumed and the small price charged will amply repay stockmen and farmers to flake all grain before feeding it.
