C. W. Kahler Is Dead.

Charles Wesley Kahler, for many years past a prominent and successful member of the bar of Jackson county and a resident of Jacksonville, died at Herndon's hospital in Ashland, Friday afternoon. Mr. Kahler had been in poor health for a number of years, and had recently been visiting the springs south of Ashland but received no benefit. When he grew worse he was brought to Ashland for treatment but did not rally sufficiently to be moved to his home in Jacksonville before the grim messenger called him.

Mr. Kahler was born in Ohio, November 20, 1840, and came to this state and Jackson county in 1852, being therefore entitled to be classed among the early pioneers of Jackson county.—Plaindealer.

He was an uncle of C. W. and George O'Flynn, former proprietors of the Salem Coffee Roaster Co., of this city, and was quite well known here.

SAINT LOUIS FAIR

St. Louis, Aug. 12.—The comments on the various Pike attractions are original and to the point, for the chaffeur certainly does know the Pike. It is when he invades the serious part of the exposition that he grows truly amusing, as, for instance, when he announces in all seriousness that that is Holland, the building that contains that famous painting, the Midnight sun, painted over a thousand years ago by Rubens.

The guard inside the building tells the visitor that he has on exhibition a very excellent copy of the painting by Rembrandt that was erroneously called "The Night Watch."

The original intention of Belgium to reproduce the Town Hall at Antwerp as its world's fair pavilion somehow has taken an unyielding hold on the fancy of the chaffeurs, despite the fact that the Belgian building is manifestly a piece of old Flemish architecture, with the Rubens triumphal arch as its central motif. The orangery of Great Britain, too, is and will remain to the end of the fair, a "rep-lik" of an English greenhouse where oranges are raised.

According to the first plans of the exposition grounds, there was to have been a Peace monument at the west end of machinery gardens. Instead, the statue of Peace was placed on the summit of the Louisiana Purchase monument, and Lorado Taft's two remarkable sculptural groups, "The Mountain" and "The Plain," were located in the beautiful gardens between the palaces of transportation and machinery. Now, as the chaffeurs pass the first of these he announces, "This statue, ladies and gentlemen, is the Father of Time, and that one is the Peace monument."

The palace of transportation, according to the man at the wheel, contained 65 miles of railroad track, and the palace of agriculture covers 42 acres. In the palace of machinery, which he persists in calling "machinery hall," he informs his wondering audience, is a 600-horsepower turbine engine that you can put in your pocket—if you have a pocket that is large enough.

Many of the wonderful things he tells about; but the crowning rhetorical effort of the ride comes when the Cascades are reached. For this speech he rises from his seat, removes his cap and begins: "This, ladies and gentlemen, is the grandest work ever undertaken by man. On yonder hill stands the Festival hall, the biggest dome in the world, containing the largest pipe organ in the world, with over 4000 keys and with pipes that a horse can walk through when it is laid down on its sides! In front of that hall is the main Cascade that pours 60,000 gallons of water a second into the magnificent Grand Basin, the largest artificial waterfall in the world, operated by three pumps the likes of which was never seen before. To the east and west of the Cascades spreads away the wonders of the rainbow gardens and the beauties of the Colorado of States, with the art building hidden in the distance just behind Festival hall. That red that you see at either side of the Cascades ladies and gentlemen, is walks, grand old walks!"

The walks described in this climactic flight are made of "burn gumbo."

Indian Camp Meeting.

Traverse City, Mich., Aug. 12.—An Indian camp meeting opened at Northport today with several hundred Indians in attendance. The meeting, which will continue ten days, is under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal church. Among the Indian preachers taking part are Rev. Thomas Nabemayash, a graduate of Albion college, and Rev. W. A. Elias of Sarina, Ont. The services are conducted in both Indian and English.
