MERCHANT CUT HIS THROAT

San Francisco Man Tried to Commit Suicide on Ocean Steamer

New York, Aug. 13.—A first class passenger named Quiller Hirschfield of San Francisco attempted to commit suicide this morning at 2 o'clock by cutting his throat aboard the French steamer LaTouraine, which arrived here today. He had written letter stating that he would kill himself. He cut his windpipe severely. His place of business is at 2239 Sutton street, San Francisco. He boarded the steamer at Havre. He has been in bad health and was despondent throughout the trip. His condition is serious.

Filipinos Will Be Benefitted.

St. Louis, Aug. 13.—Secretary of War Taft was principal speaker at the Manila day exercises. He expressed belief that the exposition will aid the Filipinos in their struggle toward a higher more progressive civilization. He favored the construction of railroads in the Philippines by the government on a guarantee of income but not by government ownership. The Philippines need and will secure from congress legislation which will bring the Philippine market within the tariff and will enable the Philippine farmer to sell to the rich markets of the United States, his products from the distant islands. He congratulated the Filipino commissioners on the excellent showing made by them at the exposition.

Drowned While Yachting.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 13.—During the boat races today a launch capsized and seven were drowned, among the bodies recovered were Miss Hazel Hizer, Dr. Charles H. Blumer and Miss Helen Moore. It is now stated that of 13 in the boat only four were saved. The accident happened at the close of the second race off Georgetown. The swift current from the flume at Sissel's mills capsized the boat. Additional bodies recovered are: Albert C. Stout, Dr. C. L. Stewart, J. George Smith, W. H. Smith, A. J. Bose, J. Herbert Coates, all from Washington.

DALLES SALOON ROBBED

Bartender Was Out and Stranger Helped Himself to the Coin

The Dalles, Ore., Aug. 14.—A robbery occurred at Matthew's saloon yesterday morning, when the till was tapped and \$12.75 came up missing. The bartender chanced to be out for a short time and two men were playing cards in the back room, when a man came in and suggested that they see what the till contained. The men refused and went on playing cards supposing he was joking. It seems, however, that he meant business for a little later when the bartender returned the till was open and the money missing. The two men started out and finding Crate, accompanied him on a search for the thief. Not long after they identified him in the Oregon saloon, when he was arrested. He denied the charge, but when put in the sweat box by Marshal Wood, confessed, giving his name as Tom Hines and saying a little change would be found under the side walk near the Union lodging house. Only 50 cents in small change was found. The fellow refused to tell what he did with the money; but said he might later.

A Rare Elks Head.

D. W. Henry of Polk county, was in the city today to get a present sent him by his son, at Rock Springs, Wyoming. It is a magnificent elk's head mounted in superb style. The antlers have five points each; and are almost perfect duplicates. When it is remembered that these proud animals are growing very rare in the west it is easy to understand why Mr. Henry prizes them so highly. In Oregon it is absolutely against the law to kill an elk under severe penalty.
