PARKER PLAYING A STRONG GAME.

While hampered by the failures of his party in the past, it cannot be truthfully said that Judge Parker is not playing a strong hand in the game of national politics.

FOLLOWING HIS BOLD BID FOR CAPITALISTIC SUPPORT, he resigns the lucrative life office of chief judge of the highest court of the Empire state.

On top of this comes his bold declaration that he will not be a candidate for a second term, a blow at the spoils element in congress and the machine managers of his own party. These are his big three trump cards for the consideration of the independent vote of the country.

His telegram for the gold standard was a SLAP AT THE TRUCULENT MANIPULATORS who wanted a platform silent on the money question, so that they could win votes either way.

That was the way McKinley won the first time. He rode on a platform that could be construed for the silver or the gold standard, or for American or international bimetalism.

His resignation of a high office severs his connection with Tammany and the local machine in New York. Whatever strings they may have had on Parker, those ligaments are now broken. This for its effect on the "people."

It is the creed of the mere office-grabber to never let go of one office until he is safely landed in another. Parker has shown his apparent contempt for mere office-holding, in order to deceive the people.

His third declaration that he will not stand for a second term, is a still bolder defiance of the party managers, apparently, as he proposes to perform the duties of the office without regard to getting in again.

The Republicans have no child's play to deal with in these propositions. They have to contend with bold declarations that lie near the heart of the IDEALS WHICH THOUSANDS OF CITIZENS ARE STRIVING TO EMULATE AND ESTABLISH.

All the minor parts of his address, in reply to the notification committee that has been delivered of its stereotyped performance, are along the lines of his party platform.

He warms his hands and cockles of his party's heart over the ancient embers of Jeffersonian platitudes.

His pleas for liberty of the citizen, and for the right to pursue any and all peaceful or lawful trade or business, are broad and of the glittering nature.

He does not make a plea for that inalienable personal liberty, that is a divine right of man in a free country, and which underlies constitutions and laws, and is essentially Democratic.

He goes into a close construction of the constitution and talks about it being A MEDIUM "TO LIMIT GOVERNMENTAL POWERS CONFERRED." He emphasizes that this "IS A GOVERNMENT OF LAWS, NOT OF MEN."

He comes out strongly on the situation in Colorado, where he intimates that both the government and the individuals concerned have violated the constitution.

He declares, in an effort to take wind out of Roosevelt's sails that the laws "SHOULD BE ENFORCED BY EVERY OFFICIAL AND SUPPORTED BY EVERY CITIZEN," an ideal well worth holding aloft.

It is when he tackles the tariff ques-

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tion that he strikes the fatal snag likely to perforate the bottom of the Democratic craft in its voyage of hope, "freighted with the interests of humanity."

He thinks if the congress and the president were Democratic a majority of the senate should be relied upon TO REVISE THE TARIFF DOWNWARDS, and it is downward alone that Democrats will talk revision.

He holds out with shrewd hope the idea that no revision is possible that will not be acceptable to the Republican majority and hence it will be safe to vote for Parker.

The sheet anchor of the situation lies in the fact as he says, "THAT WE CANNOT HOPE TO ELECT A MAJORITY IN THE SENATE DURING THE NEXT FOUR YEARS," hence Democracy could do little or no harm.

Parker is indeed a long-headed politician, and the Republicans should not underrate this admission that is thrown out to save consciences of voters that may be tempted to vote for the candidate of the opposition.

On the trust question Parker shrewdly throws a sop to Cerberus, by blandly informing the waiting world that "THE COMMON LAW AFFORDS COMPLETE LEGAL REMEDY," and officials, not the courts, have failed to perform their duty in checking and curbing the cormorants of capital.

"The failure of the courts to apply the law" against the trusts has been due to failure of administrative officials to bring the cases properly before the courts, says Judge Parker.

This is an admission that the Republican laws against trust combinations so far enacted have been good laws, but it is an accusation that the attorneys of the government have been lax or ignorant in applying those laws.

When it is recalled that PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT HAS WON ALL THE BIG SUITS brought against the railroad and other trusts, and with Parker's admission, it makes mighty poor campaign material to go on the stump with.

The rest of the Parker campaign speech is devoted to the Philippines and he simply repeats the Democratic position of attacking what has been done without suggesting any better mode of procedure.

He says in substance that we are denying them the rights of self-government that we are giving to the people of the rest of the states and territories, and this is probably a fact and unavoidable and necessary fact.

He does not deny that the American people who have dealt fairly, justly and progressively with them, and Parker shows his weak and childish faith when he leaves the inference that the declaration of independence formulated by our forefathers and a life of Jefferson would insure them "life, liberty and happiness."

Judge Parker announced in conclusion that in his formal letter of acceptance he will deal further with the political situation. This speech of acceptance is only a PRELIMINARY FEELER TO GAIN TIME for more plausible campaign thunder.

Republicans may rest assured that Parker will do his utmost to hold together all the discordant elements of the Democratic faith and invade as far as possible the ranks of the independent and doubtful Republicans.

He is making the best of the mite in which he found his party. He is putting the broken down wagon together and all into it that he can and will make supreme effort to pull mules and all out of the mud.

It is evident that he is bidding high for the support of large blocks of the capitalistic combinations that are always ready to capture the Presidency of the nation. He is outbidding Roosevelt and his managers.

It cannot be said truthfully that Roosevelt has any managers, but it is apparent that Parker is playing a well-considered game, and that each move he makes is the result of unerring counsel and shrewd advice from leaders who are not novices in the great game of politics.

THE CONFUSION OF FUSION.

That fusion often brings confusion is a fact applicable to churches as well as to matters political, as the recent and sweeping decision of the English House of Lords in the contention between the ministry of the Free Kirk and the fusionists of their denomination and of the United Presbyterian strikingly demonstrates. The Free Kirk of Scotland, Presbyterian in doctrine and form of government, was possessed of property of the aggregate value of \$30,000,000 and of very many clergymen of distinguished learning—of the genuine old Scottish brand—and of devotion to their church, while the laity was large in number and regular in attendance. In 1900 the negotiations which had been pending between the governing bodies of the two churches for union, or fusion, were brought to a conclusion. The Free Kirk of Scotland and the

United Presbyterian and the property of each church became one—as the governing bodies and the immense majority of the clergy and laity believed. The House of Lords begs leave to dissent, and, having the last guess, the dissent will govern.

Of the entire body of the Free Kirk clergy only 24 voted against fusion and entered their protest of record. They were 24 clergymen of obscure congregations in the highlands of Scotland and in the islands, ministering to their flocks in the language of the Gael and holding no intercourse with the Sassenach. They had all the old-time stubbornness of the Gael and the devotion of the children of the Solemn League and Covenant, and much of the fanaticism, and they appealed to the secular arm for protection and received it.

Their contention was that the property of the Free Kirk was held in trust only for the use of the Free Kirk, for aid in the dissemination of its doctrines and for the support of its clergy, and they conceived that it could not be diverted from such uses. In other words, they maintained the American doctrine that arbitrary power resides nowhere—not even in the largest majority, and the House of Lords held with them.

The effect of the decision is to place the government of the Free Kirk of Scotland and its \$30,000,000 of property in the hands of the 24 protesting clergymen who refused to go out. The House of Lords was not mincing in the wording of its final judgment, but the Lord Chancellor took occasion to hope that the victors would not misuse their victory. But the 24 contend that their former brethren went out of their own accord and must come back, if at all, by the accord of the few who went not out, but remained faithful and true to the Free Kirk and to its discipline.

The Lord Chancellor held that nothing in the law of Scotland could exempt the Free Kirk from the rule that funds given for one purpose could not be diverted to another. Therefore, the 24 faithful are made trustees of the \$30,000,000 and are declared the governing body of the Free Kirk. Fusion in matters religious often works the confusion that comes from fusion in politics.

AN ENTERPRISING SPIRIT.

The people of Liberty and Rosedale do not propose to drop the electric line extension. They want the road and want it bad enough to put up money and labor to secure it. They are going after it in a way that is almost certain to meet with reward and they can rest assured that the progressive business men and capitalists of Salem are with them in their enterprising movement.

They know the benefits that will accrue to the entire section of country south of this city when a rapid-transit car calls at their door for the products of the farm, orchard and dairy. They know that large farms will be subdivided and more people brought to their neighborhoods. Their schools and roads will be improved and enlarged. They will have every advantage of city life, without the usual disadvantages.

The Journal is certain that the road will be constructed and that the trolley cars will be in operation this fall. The people of the country neighborhoods have made a demand for this improvement and they will get it.

EXTRACT FROM CANNON'S SPEECH.

We have sometimes made mistakes from a false sense of security or from a desire to change policies instead of letting well enough alone, merely to see what would happen, but we have always paid the penalty of unwise action at the ballot box and endured the suffering until under the law through the ballot box, we have returned to correct policies.

Under the lead of the Republican party for over 40 years the United States, from being a third-class power among the nations, has become in every respect first.

This policy of protection has always been opposed by the opponents of the Republican party and is opposed by them today. In their last national platform, adopted at St. Louis, they denounce protection as robbery. They never have been given power, but they proceed by word and act to destroy the policy of protection. Their platform is as silent as the grave touching the gold standard and our currency system. Their chosen leader, after his nomination, having been as silent as the sphinx to that time, sent his telegram saying in substance that the gold standard is established, and that he will govern himself accordingly if he should be elected.

I congratulate him. It is better to be right late than never. It is better to be right in one thing than wrong in all things. I wonder if it ever occurred to him that if his vote and support for his party's candidate in 1896 and 1900 had been decisive we would

now have the silver standard. I wonder what made him send that telegram after he was nominated, and why he did not send it before. When did he have a change of heart and judgment? And does he at heart believe in the gold standard and our currency system, or does he try now to reap where he has not sown?

This antagonism was brought about by the carnival companies themselves, more than any other factor. They secured valuable privileges from local lodges, milked the city of several thousand dollars and in return furnished a few hootchy-kootchy shows, leaving a very bitter taste in the mouth of every person.

Salem has had two carnivals this year. The first one was about on the old order, although cleaner than the average. People were thoroughly disgusted, because they wanted something near the worth of their money. Another has just closed and a few passing words, under the circumstances, would not be amiss. The attractions were furnished by the Southern Carnival company, of which Nat Relas is the owner.

The show played several of the valley towns last year and made a good impression, although it was smaller than at present. This year it was advertised as the best carnival on earth and after a week's critical inspection we candidly believe that it is. Not an objectionable feature, but everything clean, amusing and instructive. It is a remarkable fact that in a city the size of Salem, with almost 14,000 inhabitants, that not a single arrest was made during the week that was in any way traceable to the carnival, its employees or attaches, although about 200 men and women are on the Reiss payroll. The Reiss shows will have no trouble in making Salem next year or any other year, and as long as they carry the same class of attractions they will be greeted with the same throngs every day during their stay. It is a pleasure to be entertained by such entertainers.
