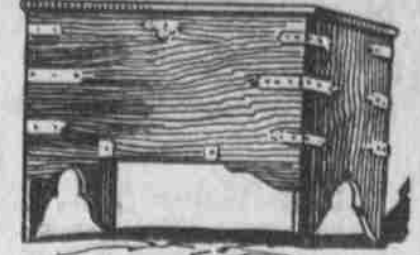

## CITY DADS MEET

City council met last evening and transacted considerable business. The opening of Court street was considered and an ordinance for that purpose reported favorably from the committee on ordinances, and passed. The same committee also asked for further time in reporting the ordinances of renaming and renumbering the streets and for the establishment of the grade on South Commercial street. The committee was granted power to draft an ordinance compelling the removal of moss from buildings. The committee on streets reported the Willson Avenue improvements under way, but objection was entered by Alderman Bayne and led to a lively debate. The committee claimed that it had the power under the resolution to let the contract for the building of the sidewalk and curbing, but this was denied and the bids were asked for. Every thing was harmony after a time and the improvements will be made after the contract is signed by the mayor.

Alderman Gesner desired to know the standing of the voters within the city limits under the new primary law and offered the suggestion that the city recorder make inquiry concerning this important matter. Recorder Judah volunteered to do the work and will prepare a report in a short time.

The question of improving Court street with crushed rock was considered and a committee consisting of Mayor Waters, Aldermen Crossan and Hughes was appointed to investigate the cost.

The committee on ordinances was instructed to draft ordinances for the extension of the present fire limits if the city to conform to the new city limits and for the extension of the cement sidewalk district.

The committee on lights asked for further time to consider the bids for lighting the city, and it was granted.
