LUMBER OPERATIONS STOPPED

Eastern Camps Are Being Dismantled on Account of Scarcity of Timber

Minneapolis, Aug. 18.—The West Newton rafting works of the Mississippi River Logging Co., a few miles above this place, have been operated for the last time.

This announcement has just been made by W. F. Weyerhaeuser, president of the company, and a crew of 100 men are engaged in dismantling the great camp, which in seasons past have accommodated the 2000 rivermen in the employ of the company.

The announcement marks the first long step in the passing of the lumber industry in the Northwest, an industry which has made scores of millions, built countless towns and furnished employment for hundreds of thousands—a picturesque industry, with its traditions of deeds of extraordinary daring, its rough men in strange garb, its bosses who ruled small armies of turbulent spirits, and its mixed dialect of French, Indian and Swedish phrases.

The man who has made perhaps the greatest fortune out of logging on the upper Mississippi and Chipewa rivers is F. W. Weyerhaeuser, of St. Paul, who has been called the lumber king of the world. His fortune has variously estimated at from \$50,000,000 to \$75,000,000, and is, of course, constantly increasing. Beginning at Rock Island, Ill., as a humble employee in a lumber mill, he rose rapidly to a pre-eminent place. Along the upper Mississippi the rivermen speak of the stream as "Weyerhaeuser's Ditch."

A Runaway Match.

In the culmination of this scene, the cook at the hotel, the waiters, the landlady and other guests become embroiled and the curtain goes down on a climax that is side-splitting in its humor. Then the landlady's bill has not been liquidated in the haste of departure by the two couples, and serious consequences are threatened, which ominously cloud the honeymoon of the love-sick and matrimonially-inclined twain, which give rise to complications that are extremely funny. It is needless to state that the entire affair is satisfactorily straightened out in the end, and peace reigns at last. Throughout the entire play, the opportunity is given, and taken advantage of, for the introduction of clever specialties in songs and dances, presented by the various characters in the cast, which is exceptionally strong, being composed of clever players.

MAKE POOR MONEY

Eastern Counterfeiters Are Active at This Time of Year

Elizabeth, N. J., Aug. 18.—The counterfeiting of small coins for which offense a dozen men have been arrested in New Jersey within the past ten days, is given impetus every year at this season, according to secret service operatives by the approach of the "country fair." The operatives say that the opportunities to pass bad money at the many state and county fairs throughout the east are such that small counterfeiters, thieves and the worst class of fakirs cannot let them pass.

Some men who follow the circuit of fairs, will do anything, except work honestly, to make a little money and they turn to the moulding of cheap counterfeiters to get small capital to start some faking enterprise or to use in connection with the operation of such enterprises at the fairs. As a result there is usually counterfeiting going on a small scale in many places throughout the east at this season.

Bad Money for Countrymen.

These makers of small coins move from place to place and when the fairs open the farmer, the farm-hand and the country young man who takes his sweetheart to the country exhibit get as many of these counterfeiters as the fakir can turn over in exchange for good money. It is believed that the so-called tramps, who were found making counterfeiters near Burlington and others recently arrested by Chief Matthew P. Griffin and his subordinates of the Newark Secret Service bureau belong to a syndicate that was preparing for the fairs.

Austrian Emperor's Birthday.

Vienna, Aug. 18.—The 74th birthday of Emperor Francis Joseph was celebrated with fetes throughout the dual empire today. In the capital there was a grand review of troops and a general illumination of the city. The venerable emperor just returned from his visit to King Edward at Marlborough observed the anniversary by granting amnesty to a large number of prisoners undergoing sentence for minor crimes.

Francis Joseph was proclaimed Emperor of Austria on the abdication of his uncle, Ferdinand I., on Dec. 2, 1848. He was crowned King of Hungary, June 8, 1867. He married in 1854 Elizabeth, a daughter of Duke Maximilian of Bavaria. The emperor was assassinated by an anarchist in Geneva, September 10, 1898. Of the emperor's three children the Crown Prince Rudolf committed suicide, and, as his daughters, the Archduchesses Gisela and Marie, are ineligible, his brother Charles Louis will become emperor when the beloved monarch ends his beneficent rule.

Americanist Congress.

The family association numbers thousands of members, prominent among them being Senator Charles W. Fairbanks, the Republican candidate for vice-president, and Secretary Victor A. Metcalf.

The reunion, which will last several days, is being held at the historic Fairbanks homestead, which was built of timbers brought over by the original Fairbanks settler from England in 1633.

CLAIM DOUBLE DEAL

Evening Telegram Writer Sees Things About Politics

The Evening Telegram says regarding the contests for presidency of the senate and speakership:

"Rumor is rife in the air of a political combination by which it is sought to land Franklin Pierce Mays in the presidential chair of the Oregon state senate and Thomas Benton Kay in the speakership of the house of representatives. By the terms of the deal the Multnomah house delegation is to be given in exchange for the Marion county senatorial delegation, thus securing 10 votes for Franklin Pierce Mays, with but three more to get to make the for once lucky number of 13 required to convert a plain senator into Mr. President."

The same rumor in the same breath credits the authorship of this alleged manipulation to Judge Charles H. Carey, and the one who is expected to pay the penalty of the contemplated exchange is A. A. Bailey, whose chances of becoming Speaker of the House have generally been considered good, conditional upon his holding the allegiance of the home delegation.

Hence there is wrath of the kind that penetrates circles political in times like these in the ranks of Mr. Bailey's friends, for it has all along been more or less understood that Franklin Pierce Mays didn't want the job of president and that all was clear for Bailey to sail to that height of his political ambition in regard to the next biennial session. What the effect of such a deal would be, if carried out, affords room for some speculation, and there are those who do say that Multnomah would lose all in an attempt to gobble the biggest piece of pie on the political plate.

But suppose the trade were carried through, say the wisacres of these times of political commerce, where would Multnomah get the necessary three after the local seven had been added to the three from the county of Marion? Where would they get the wherewith to fill the hiatus thus remaining? Eastern Oregon, they say, will loom up as did General Jackson at the battle of Bull Run, for the powers of Malcom Moody have no use for Franklin Pierce Mays, by virtue of the past, and the day of Moody is not yet gone in Eastern Oregon. True, they do say that with the possible exception of John Rand, nary a senator who resides beyond the Cascades would give his vote to Multnomah while Franklin Pierce Mays leads the procession.

Not only that, they say, but how are they going to reckon with the man Nottingham, the renowned independent senator from Multnomah, who caused A. A. Courtney to pale and glimmer as a political possibility in Multnomah county? The man Nottingham, they say, is ungovernable and will do not one thing the bosses say, and thus he should be counted out of Multnomah's 11, hence there may be even more of a shortage in the ranks of the followers of Franklin Pierce Mays than doth now appear.

And then again the wise ones say, and there seems reason in their saying that George Clayton Brownell and Physician Kuykendall will not long remain idle when there comes within the pale of their hearing a tale of the plan for their undoing, for they still say that George C. wants to be President, and that Physician Kuykendall aspires thereto has become a part of the political lore of this queer age. Hence, it is said, there will beyond the preadvantage of a single doubt be formed another combination, if, indeed one, hath not ere this been formed, the object of which will be quite another one than the elevation of Franklin Pierce Mays from the ranks of ordinary senators.

him was made mention of the reputed combination. "Purely a deal to give him the double-cross, for the senator prefers one of the two men now after the place outside of Multnomah county."

"What will be the effect? Why Multnomah will lose both places, Eastern Oregon won't vote for Mays, and Brownell and Kuykendall have Clackamas county and southern Oregon in line already. If Marion sells the presidency to Multnomah for the speakership, southern Oregon and the country east of the Cascades will rise up against the whole combination and bust the slate all around. If this deal goes through, you may look for a combination between Brownell and Kuykendall that will make it pretty hard, if not too hard altogether, for Multnomah to get the presidency of the senate."

The deal in question has been kept subrosa. It was born but a few days ago, at a conference of political interests, few in number, and the office of Judge Carey is said to have been the place where the council was held.
