

BREWERY ELECTS OFFICERS

Leopold Schmidt Retires From Presidency, but Retains Interests

The stockholders of the Salem Brewery Association held their annual meeting recently, and the following officers were elected:

President, T. M. Kenney.
Vice-president, F. G. Deckerbach.
Treasurer, Stanislaus Zyanda.
Secretary, Wm. H. Wolf.

The directors are Messrs. Kinney, Deckerbach and Mr. Zyanda. The new officers took charge at once, and the entire plant is under their management. Leopold Schmidt, former president and principal stockholder, retired on account of a contemplated absence next year in Europe, although he still retains his interests. Mr. Schmidt is president of the Olympia and Bellingham Bay breweries, and has established the leading brewing business on the coast. The new president, F. M. Kenney, is secretary of the Olympia Brewing Company, and is a resident of that city.

F. G. Deckerbach recently moved to Salem from Olympia, and, besides being vice-president, is an outside manager.

Stanislaus Zyanda, the treasurer, purchased the old Klinger & Beck brewery in June, 1933, and is also superintendent of the interior. He was formerly employed by Mr. Schmidt at Bellingham Bay, and has been in the business all of his life. He was recently secretary of the company.

Wm. H. Wolf, the new secretary, has been a resident of Salem for about four years, and has been with the company several months.

The brewery expects to make a number of improvements at once. The bottling works will be renovated, and the capacity increased, and by next season the number of men employed will be materially increased.

The brew is considered equal to any on the coast, and is fast gaining a reputation.

FARM RANCH RANGE

Title of New Book Prepared by Hon. Wallis Nash

"Farm, Ranch and Range in Oregon" is the title of the new handbook to be issued by the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition Commission. The author is Wallace Nash, and the book has half a dozen suggestive illustrations.

It commences with a description of the six districts of Oregon, defined as follows: 1. Northeastern Oregon, the wheat belt and stock ranches. 2. The irrigable lands of Central Oregon. 3. The Willamette valley. 4. The coast region, from the Columbia to the southeastern boundary of the state. 5. Southern Oregon, including the Umpqua and Rogue river valleys. 6. Southeastern Oregon, including the lake region, and the large stock ranches and ranges.

The next question discussed is "How Far Will Capital Go in Buying Land in Oregon?" with some account of prices of land in 1934.

Then follows "What Should a Newcomer Do With Various Sums of Capital in Starting Life on the Farm in Oregon?" The next question stated and answered is: "Having Bought the Farm, What Shall I Do With It?"

Short accounts follow on the following subjects: "The Livestock Industry," "Sheep," "Angora Goats," "Hogs," "The Dairy," "Irrigation," "Transportation," "Electric Roads," "Public Education," "The Higher Education," "Fraternalities" and "Churches." A short appendix affords a condensed statement of the average temperature and extremes of average precipitation at several points in five of the six districts referred to from the United States weather records.

Plain statements of fact, accuracy, candor, freedom from boast and lack of extravagance mark the 32 pages of well-digested matter that Mr. Nash has prepared. The handbook is just the thing to put into the hands of a man who seriously contemplates removal to a country that offers real advantages to the tiller of the soil. A greater part of the first edition of 50,000 copies will be distributed at the St. Louis Fair. The book is being printed by State Printer Whitney.

Lived at Gervais.

An examination of the body of Dennis McCauley, the sheep herder, who was found dead in the Mt. Hood neighborhood, about 32 miles from Hood River, Friday, confirmed the suspicions of those who knew him that he had been drinking heavily, which, together with the intense heat, caused heart failure. The coroner, upon reaching there, found it unnecessary to hold an inquest, as no marks, which would indicate foul play were discovered, and made arrangements for temporary burial until later, when it is likely the body will be moved to Gervais. The body was discovered by Fred Kemp, who is foreman for Mr. Roberts.
