## ROT TEN SOCIAL LIFE

Many Women Are Kept by Russian Officers in the Field

St. Petersburg, Aug. 19.—The nomination of Prince Obolensky to be governor of Finland has produced widespread discontent in that country, and that the country is on the brink of an open rebellion seems almost certain. The czar could not have sent a man more hated by the Finns and more despised by all decent men than this prince, who, when governor of Kharkoff, caused women to be flogged in public places on the most flimsy of pretexts.

Then followed the most insulting inquisition case, which illustrates the rottenness of the public officers of the czar in Warsaw. The suspected woman was a notorious character. Upon the entry of the police the woman came from her room. Immediately wine was opened for the officers. This was followed by the wildest orgies, and all thought of Nihilism or revolutionary evidence was forgotten.

It was necessary for the police wagon to remove the guardians of the law, for they were unable to help themselves. And this rotten condition of affairs is to be found in almost every part of the official life of Russia. When young Duke Boris was ordered back from the front it was made to appear that his train load of chorus girls and demi-mondes was something that the Russian officials could not countenance, but this is not so. Drawing his sword on Gen. Kuropatkin was an act that could not be winked at.

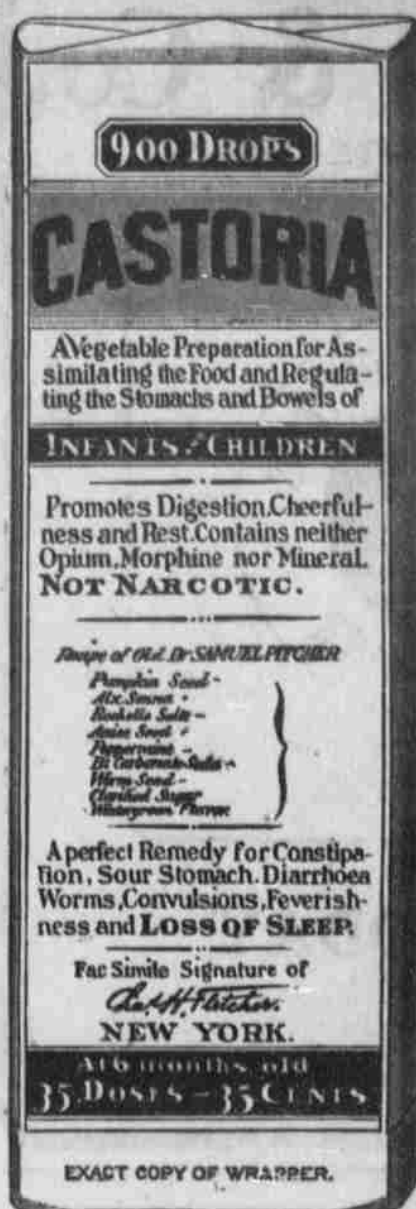
