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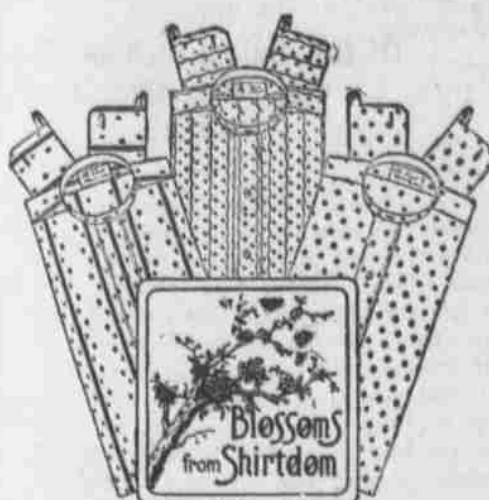

NEAT PRINT SHOP

A Journal reporter in his rambles visited the business office, the composing and press rooms of the Gault Printing company, at 71 Chemeketa street. The personnel of the company is W. H. L. E. and D. M. C. Gault, all well known, especially the latter, who has a state reputation as a publisher and a newspaper man. The present co-partnership was formed last February, at which time a job office owned by Mr. Henry Pape was purchased. The Gaults added new material and machinery to the first purchase, and at once attracted the attention of the business people of Salem by the superior work turned out, and its prompt delivery to patrons. Their motto is "On time every time," which with them has a meaning. At the end of three months, the company made a further addition to its plant, more than doubling the original cost. Their most elegant machine is their Cottrell pony cylinder that prints a sheet 25x30 inches in size. This is the usual 16-page book form. The press is a type of the best machine put out by the Cottrell & Sons Co., that has been building presses for 50 years.

W. H. Gault, who has charge of the mechanical department, has selected his type faces with very good taste and his arrangement of type is jobs follows the latest fashions shown in Eastern work. Indeed some of his work has been adopted as models by Chicago printers. The firm is particular not to let a piece of work go out unless it is the best that can be executed. Their office is very pleasantly situated on Chemeketa street, between Front and Commercial, and visitors have a most cordial welcome whether they have work or not.

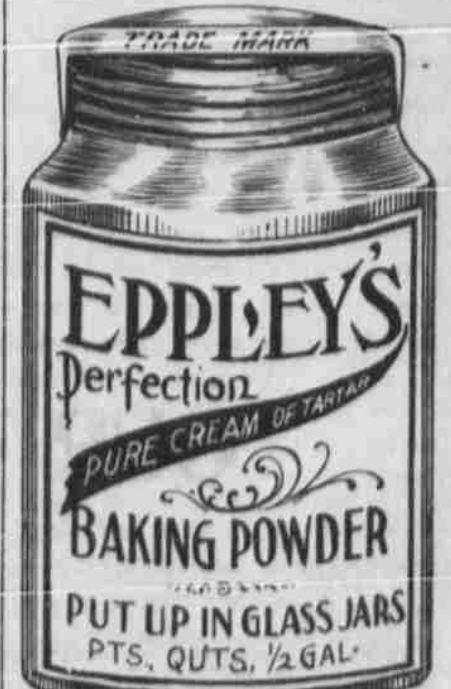
