GIVES GIRLS ADVICE

When They Reach Eighteen Should Read Certain Novels

London, Aug. 20.—Mrs. Pearl Craigie, known to literature as "John Oliver Hobbes," earnestly defended her startling advice that every girl, on reaching the age of 18 years, should be given "Tom Jones" to read. She says:

"I consider Fielding as a nerve tonic nowadays, an antidote to the morbid neurotic twaddle which, under various disguises—romantic, sentimental and historical—is consumed by girl and woman readers.

"If I had a daughter I should certainly give her the works of Fielding. I should be sorry, of course, that she should have to make the acquaintance of many severe facts Fielding deals out, but she would have to learn these things at one time or another, and I do not think she could learn them in a better way than by reading 'Amelia.'

"The heroes drawn by Fielding are not models of good conduct, but he is always careful to give them excellent hearts, and if not capable of flights of poetic feeling they are infinitely capable of steadfast action.

"In the modern novels the tendency is to draw men as meek, quiet, lady-like, whereas the women indulge in extraordinary adventures and emotions. The women are the rakes, and the heroes would seem to be timid spinsters. I prefer the old school.

"What I most admire about Fielding is that, however self-indulgent his men may be, he always does splendid justice to the highest type of women. They are so strong, sensible and pure that they always emerge triumphant from all the perils of temptation and influences which surround them."

Fell in River.

Joe Albers, of Corvallis, narrowly escaped drowning last Saturday night, at Toledo, about 12 o'clock, by wandering off of the wharf back of M. L. Glass' saloon, falling a distance of about 14 feet, striking the extreme edge of the launch Racine, making a slight abrasion on his forehead. Cries for help preceded by a splash, were heard, and a number of the boarders at the Parker house, were aroused. Among the first to appear on the scene were R. S. VanCleve and F. H. Parker, who done the rescue act, picking Joe up about 300 yards from where he fell in. He had sunk the third time with just the top of his head sticking out. He was landed on the mill yard, and, under the care of R. S. VanCleve and the early appearance of Dr. Wetmore, was restored to consciousness, and Saturday made his departure for home.
