SCORCHING AND HEROISM

Much admiration is being expressed for the young woman at a Connecticut summer resort, who drove her automobile into a lake to avoid a collision with a carriage.

The young woman developed rare presence of mind and fine courage. But it must be admitted that a still better presence of mind might have entirely saved her from such an emergency.

Had she possessed the presence of mind to keep her machine at safe speed and under instantaneous control these would have been no danger of a collision and no need of risking her life to save others.

An ounce of good sense in driving an automobile is better than all rock-less heroism in the world.

There is really nothing so very extraordinary in this young woman's risking her own life to save the lives that she herself had put into jeopardy.

Heroism that sacrifices self when self is not at fault is of an altogether different quality.

Automobile scorching has become one of the most fatal evils of the day. It is not to be mitigated by an occasional act of heroism, even though the heroine be a beautiful young woman.

There is higher heroism in resisting the custom of fast speeding that imperils lives.

Russia has lost one of its best astronomers by the death of Theodore Bredikhine. He was successively director of the observatories at Moscow and St. Petersburg. In the latter case it was his important duty to Russianize the institution by ousting the Germans and Swedes who had made it famous. His own specialty was comets' tails, regarding the formation of which he had an electric theory.

Ice Cave Discovered

A party consisting of W. W. Collins, Mrs. A. M. Kelly, Mrs. Emma A. Hammond and C. C. Randolph arrived Tuesday from the Sand Springs country, where most of them have claims.

Mr. Collins has been engaged for some time in estimating timber in the region to the southwestward of Sand Springs. While engaged in this work he discovered a new cave having five large chambers containing unknown quantities of clear ice. This is located just over the border of Crook into Lake county. In the first two chambers ice was thawed, making considerable pools of good water; in the other three chambers the ice was solid. A jet six feet deep failed to reach the bottom of the ice.

The ice cave is on the homestead of Mrs. Louise M. Christman, a colored woman, who recently submitted her final proof.—Sand Springs.
