Japanese infantry assaulted it and compelled the Russians to retire. The Russian artillery then directed a heavy fire on the spot, and compelled the Japanese in their turn to retire.

Refuse to Dismantle.

Washington, Aug. 22.—A dispatch to the state department from Consul-General Goodnow, at Shanghai, confirms the press dispatch relative to the entrance to the harbor of a Japanese torpedo boat, followed by the American vessel Chauncey. The Russian consul still refuses to comply with the order to dismantle or leave the harbor. Acting Secretary of State Adee and Acting Secretary of the Navy Darling are now in a conference on the subjects presented in the dispatches.

Lost Twenty-Five Hundred

Rome, Aug. 22.—A telegram today from Chefoo states that the Japanese losses in the last assault were 2500 men, including 63 officers.

Italians Will Co-operate.

Rome, Aug. 22.—It is announced today that the Italian squadron in the Far East has been ordered to co-operate with the American fleet to maintain the neutrality of China.

Vessels Must Leave.

Shanghai, Aug. 22.—The consuls held another meeting this afternoon. The Tao Tai has given the Askold and Grosni until noon tomorrow to leave the port. No repairs on the vessels will be permitted. The Askold, however, cannot cross the bar this week, owing to the low tides.

Consuls Issue Statement.

Shanghai, Aug. 22.—The meeting of the foreign consuls resulted in the preparation of a statement to establish the facts regarding the Russian warships in the harbor.

Bombarded Island.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 22.—The Russian commandant at Korsakova island, Sakhalin, sends the following report: "Since 7 o'clock this morning the enemy bombarded Korsakova, and the government houses were destroyed. One of the enemy's ships appeared on the horizon at 6 o'clock this morning and approached to within five miles of the shore, and bombarded Korsakova until 8:15 a. m., when the vessel turned and disappeared. The damage to the town is considerable, and no casualties resulted."

Squadron Will Assist.
Chefoo, Aug. 22.—A launch which

arrived today from Wei Hai Wei reports seeing yesterday four Japanese battleships and two cruisers, including the Kasuga, going in a northerly direction from Wei Hai Wei. The squadron was apparently headed for Port Arthur.

Captured One Fort.

Chefoo, Aug. 22.—The Japanese have swept the Russians from Pigeon Bay, and captured the northernmost fort of the western line of inner defenses at Port Arthur. The Russian artillery prevents the Japanese from occupying the fort on Pigeon Bay.

Fighting Continues.

Chefoo, Aug. 22.—The steamer Victoria, which arrived here at 7 o'clock this evening from New Chwang, reports heavy firing on Lousia and Pigeon Bays between 10 o'clock last night and 1 o'clock this morning. Searchlights were playing freely and skyrockets used for signalling could be observed from the steamers.

Crew Went Down.

Tokio, Aug. 22.—According to advices received a severe storm came up after the sinking of the Russian cruiser Novik by the Japanese cruisers Chitose and Akitsushima yesterday, preventing the Japanese from rescuing any of the crew of the Novik, which numbered 334.

Bodies Are Found.

Bellingham, Wash., Aug. 22.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of William McKenzie, who was last seen two weeks ago in company with Miss Kate Bast, was cleared away yesterday by the discovery of his body floating in the waters of Lake Whatcom.

Late in the afternoon the body of Miss Kate Bast was also discovered floating in the waters of Lake Whatcom.

Funeral of William Wicks.

The funeral of William Wicks, a Salem painter, was conducted yesterday afternoon by Rev. Father Murphy, of the Catholic church.

Shot Claim-Jumper.

St. Marys, Idaho, Aug. 22.—Two men are dead and a third is missing as a result of a row over alleged claim-jumping on Marble creek, near here. Last night the bodies of P. Bouly and N. Lindsay were found on the trail between Marble Creek and Gordon. Bouly's body had 13 bullet holes. The bodies were some distance apart. The third man, Tyler, is missing.

Only the most meagre information has been obtained here. It is said Bouly and Lindsay were claim-jumpers. Nothing is known about Tyler.

The sheriff and coroner left for the scene this afternoon, and have not yet returned. Excitement prevails in St. Marys, as there has been threatening talk about alleged claim-jumping for several months.

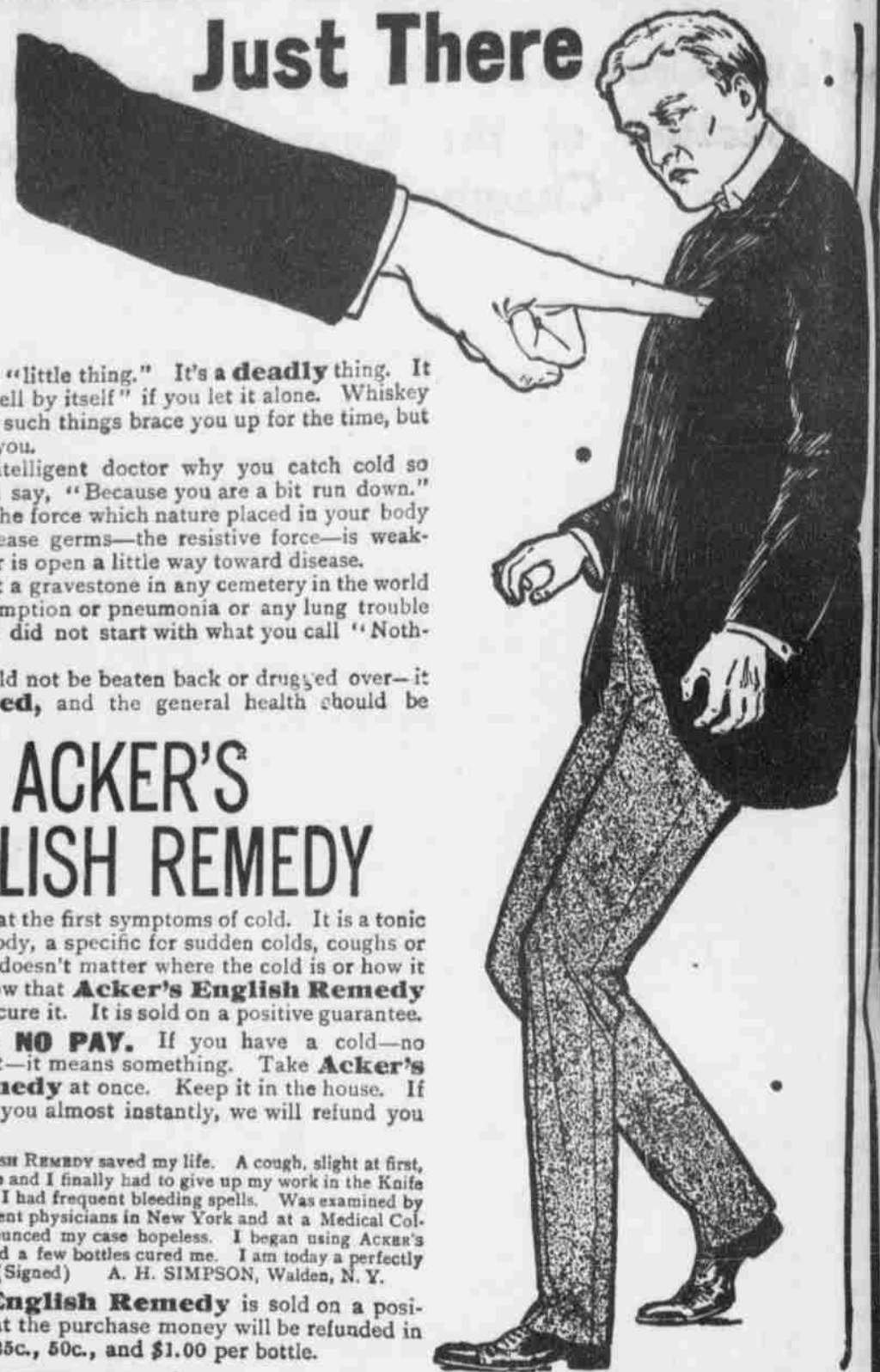
