RUSSIAN SPY WAS BRAVE

Donned Garb of a Chinaman, but Was Discovered

St. Petersburg, Aug. 23.—An interesting story of the adventures of a Russian spy named Volkoff is published here. The man gives the following account of his experiences.

"After the battle of Wafangkow I was lying near General Samsonoff's tent, and heard him say to the commander of the regiment, 'We must send out a scout to the Japanese who could spy out their positions and report to us.' I offered to go disguised to the Japanese position. I was given six roubles to bribe Chinamen, if necessary, and also a revolver. I shaved my hair in front like a Chinaman, tied on a pigtail, and put on a Chinese dress, with slippers and hat.

"At dawn on July 20 I came to the town of Senachen. There was nobody there. The Russians had left it, and the Chinese had all run away. Suddenly a cavalry detachment of about 20 men with an officer came toward me. The officer rode out and asked in Chinese where the Russians were and what was their strength. I know a little Chinese, and answered him, but either I said something wrong or he noticed my revolver and money bulging out. At any rate, he became suspicious, and spoke some words to his men. Two of the latter thereupon dismounted and came toward me. I decided to sell my life dearly, for I knew it would be forfeited if I were captured. I pulled out my revolver, and as the two soldiers approached I fired two shots at them. Both the men fell. I then fired at the officer, bringing him to the ground, and afterwards emptied the revolver at four other men. The soldiers lost their heads and galloped away, and as they did so I saw four men I had shot at fall severely from their saddles wounded.

"Then I jumped on one of the horses which had remained close by and galloped away for my life. General Samsonoff promoted me to the rank of an officer, gave me the horse and saddle, and sent me on to the commander-in-chief, who thanked and embraced me."

Texas Republicans. Fort Worth, Texas, Aug. 23.—With prospects bright for a harmonious gathering, the Republican state convention to nominate a state ticket was called to order here today. With practically no chance of capturing any of the state offices the party leaders are hopeful of winning in one or more of the congressional districts and to this end will urge the national committee to contribute to the campaign funds. It is said that the convention will adopt a resolution formally inviting ex-Governor James Hogg, who recently assailed the Democratic national ticket, to join the Republican party.

The Republican League of Texas met this morning and chose delegates to attend the convention of the National Republican League to be held at Indianapolis in October. Waco, Texas, Aug. 23.—Representative Prohibitionists of Texas assembled in state convention here today and were called to order in the city hall at 10 o'clock this morning. The convention will name candidates for the state offices to be filed at the November election. On the opening of the state convention a rousing ovation was given George W. Carroll, of Beaumont, the Prohibition candidate for vice-president.

Dominion M. D.'s in Session. Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 23.—Prominent physicians and surgeons from all over the Dominion were present today at the opening of the annual convention of the Canadian Medical association. The convention will be in session several days. Following its close the members of the association will take an excursion to Alaska as guests of the Coast medical fraternity.

The Divine Sarah Mulcted. Paris, Aug. 23.—A child actress, Suzanne Jugierska, has obtained \$50 damages from Mme. Sarah Bernhardt for breach of contract. The youthful actress had been engaged for the role of Madame Royal, in "Varennec," but after 10 rehearsals Mme. Bernhardt refused to let her appear. The court held that this could not be done without incurring a liability, nor was the artist bound to accept the substitution of another role under such conditions.
