**PACKERS AT LAST APPOINT COMMITTEE**  
**To Confer With Members of the City Council--Strike Breakers Walk Out**

Chicago, Aug. 25.—The packers at the meeting today appointed a committee of three to confer with the peace committee of the council tomorrow. Fifty strike-breakers at the Morris plant, struck today out of sympathy with their leader, Frank Norris, who had been discharged because he insisted on smoking in the sleeping apartment. The men demanded his reinstatement, which was refused.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—Ogden Armour has received intimate knowledge of

the dangers of strike rioting. This morning while on his way to the yards his buggy drove into a crowd of disorderly strikers whom the police were trying to force back from the entrance to the yards. The presence of Armour enraged the strikers and there were yells of "Stone him," as the crowd threateningly surrounded the buggy. The police made a charge and clubbed the crowd sending them flying in all directions. Armour lost no time in getting inside the shelter of the fence.
