FISH TOOK TO LAND

Red Apple, Ont., Aug. 26.—Thomas Gilhooly, of Red Apple, in this county, was surprised recently while hunting snake eggs in his orchard; to discover a huge catfish sitting as contentedly as might an old hen, on a batch of young oyster eggs in a bread fruit tree.

Gilhooly was simply astonished. There is no water nearer than Lake Erie, 30 miles away, except an old well that had long since been dried up. How the fish ever traveled all the way from the lake to the tree is what Gilhooly and his neighbors would like to know.

Gilhooly took the fish and the eggs home with him. The oysters were hatched a few days ago and the fish attends them the same as if they were her own.

The strangest thing about the fish, however, was discovered by the local school teacher, Mr. Skoop, who was one of the first to visit it. He says it can speak four languages fluently. Mrs. Gilhooly was recently surprised on entering the kitchen to find the fish frying eggs. Mr. Gilhooly will take the fish to the world's fair.

Centenary of the Legion of Honor.

Paris, Aug. 26.—One of the things in which Paris is most interested just now is the celebration of the centenary of the Legion of Honor, which was constituted by the Emperor Napoleon one hundred years ago. The celebration formally opened today with a grand military display attended by President Loubet, and by the many distinguished members of the order, among them the American ambassador, General Horace Porter. The exercises of today will be followed by another review of troops and appropriate fetes on the spot near Boulogne where Napoleon stood when he distributed the first insignia of the legion to his generals, his statesmen, and his scientists.

In connection with the celebration it is interesting to note that Secretary of State John Hay and General Porter are the only two Americans who have received the grand cross and cordon of the Legion of Honor. Ferdinand Peck, who was commissioner of the United States to the Paris exposition of 1900, and Charlemagne Tower, the present American ambassador to Germany, have the stars of grand officers, while there are several score of other Americans in various walks of life who have crosses of commander, officer, or knight of the order.

Louisiana Ready for Launching.

Newport News, Va., Aug. 26.—At the yards of the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company today a small army of workmen were busy getting everything in shape for the launching of the giant battleship Louisiana tomorrow. Arrangements have been made by the company to entertain a large number of visitors who will be here from New Orleans, Washington, Baltimore, Richmond and other point. The christening ceremony will be performed by Miss Juanita Lalland, of New Orleans.

Ghost Was Surprised.

Hunnet, Eng., Aug. 26.—Arthur Blacker played ghost the other night once too often.

Attired in flowing white robes and carrying a candle, he held a crowd of rusties spellbound for a while.

A gust of wind blew his robe into the candle flame and in an instant his ghostship was ablaze. He yelled for help, but the startled yokels thought this was the spirit's method of disappearing and took to their heels. Blacker was seriously burned.

Catholic Church for Scio.

The money necessary to buy the ground upon which to erect a new Catholic church has been raised, and Wednesday Father Charles Seronski, of Sublimity, was in Scio to complete the arrangements. He will raise the funds necessary to build the church by subscription and has already a good start toward the amount needed. He will return here Monday to complete the subscription list and work will commence at once upon the new building.—Scio News.

The very good suggestion is made that during the state fair a train be run from Albany at about 12:30 after the arrival of the trains on the Corvallis & Eastern from the west and east and the Lebanon train, giving the people of the surrounding country an opportunity to make the trip the same day in time for the races.
