ATTACKS LOCAL OPTION

Henry Weinhard the Portland Brewer Files Complaint

Portland, Aug. 27.—The local option law is declared to be unconstitutional, invalid and void for many reasons which were set forth in a complaint which was filed yesterday in the state circuit court by Henry Weinhard, the well-known brewer, against County Clerk Frank S. Field and Judge L. R. Webster, W. L. Lightner and Frank C. Barnes, comprising the board of county commissioners.

A decree is prayed for, adjudging, determining and decreeing the local option law to be unconstitutional, invalid and void, and enjoining the county commissioners from enforcing an election to be held on November 8, 1904, to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in this county. An injunction is asked restraining County Clerk P. S. Field from taking any steps or proceedings looking towards the holding of any such election, and enjoining them and each of them from expending the moneys of Multnomah county for such purpose. A preliminary restraining order is asked, and was issued by Judge George, and was made returnable September 1th. After a final hearing of the case, the injunction is asked to be made perpetual.

The following reasons are urged against the constitutionality and validity of the law:

Because it was not submitted to the governor for his approval, was not signed by him, nor returned with his objections, nor filed by him in the office of the secretary of state; that the law was not legally submitted to the electors, because the petition for its submission was not signed by 8 per cent of the voters; that it confers an unlawful delegation of legislative authority to the county court; that the title does not give notice that it is unlawful to sell liquors; that the initiative and referendum act is contrary to the constitution of the United States wherein a republican form of government is guaranteed; that it unlawfully prohibits the sale of liquor on the prescription of a physician not engaged in practice; that it is contrary to section 31 of the constitution; that it unlawfully attempts to delegate the prohibition question to precincts, and that it provides for illegal search warrants and rules of evidence.

Korean Minister Can Not Leave His Post Until Bills Are Paid

St. Petersburg, Aug. 27.—The Korean minister replied to the instructions of his government to return home that he had borrowed \$4,000 rubles to maintain the embassy, and his creditors refused to permit his departure until all bills were paid.

NOTED MINISTER ARRIVES

New York, Aug. 27.—St. Rev. Randall Davidson, archbishop of Canterbury and wife, arrived on the Celtic today, and proceeded to Quebec, where they will attend the convention of the Protestant Episcopal church in October. They will visit a number of American cities before they return.

Robbed His Mother.

Hillsboro, Or., Aug. 27.—Constable R. R. Seppington, of Hillsboro, returned yesterday, after a week's chase with a warrant for the arrest of Edward E. Austin, of this city, and late of Cornelius. Austin is charged with having, on August 13th, feloniously embezzled \$2000 belonging to his mother. The money taken being every cent Austin's aged mother possessed, she endeavored to have him returned to answer for his alleged crime. The constable traced his man to British Columbia, there lost all track of him and was compelled to return alone.

A farm at Cornelius in which Austin and his mother were interested was sold recently and the proceeds divided between them. The mother requested the son to take her share and deposit it in the bank in her name. Instead the money was deposited in the son's name, and he refused to deliver it over upon demand.

Mrs. Austin then brought suit in the circuit court against her son for an accounting, and after the papers were served Austin departed.

Robbed Farmer of Money.

Sheridan, Or., Aug. 27.—Two masked men bound and gagged A. J. Wolfe, a farmer living seven miles from here, at his home Thursday night, and escaped with \$217, leaving no clue. Wolfe was known to keep considerable money about the premises usually.

From Wolfe's they went to the farm of Allen Yeakum, near by, and stole two horses, with saddles and bridles. They were heard passing through Sheridan at midnight.

Several hours later one of the horses walked into the feed stable at McMinnville, where Mr. Wolfe had been accustomed to put up when in the county seat. There is no trace of the other yet.

Wolfe is a well-known rancher. He is father of the sheriff of Tillamook county.

Cannon is the keeper of the Mormon temple at St. George, Utah, and is a brother to the late George Q. Cannon, first counselor to Brigham Young.

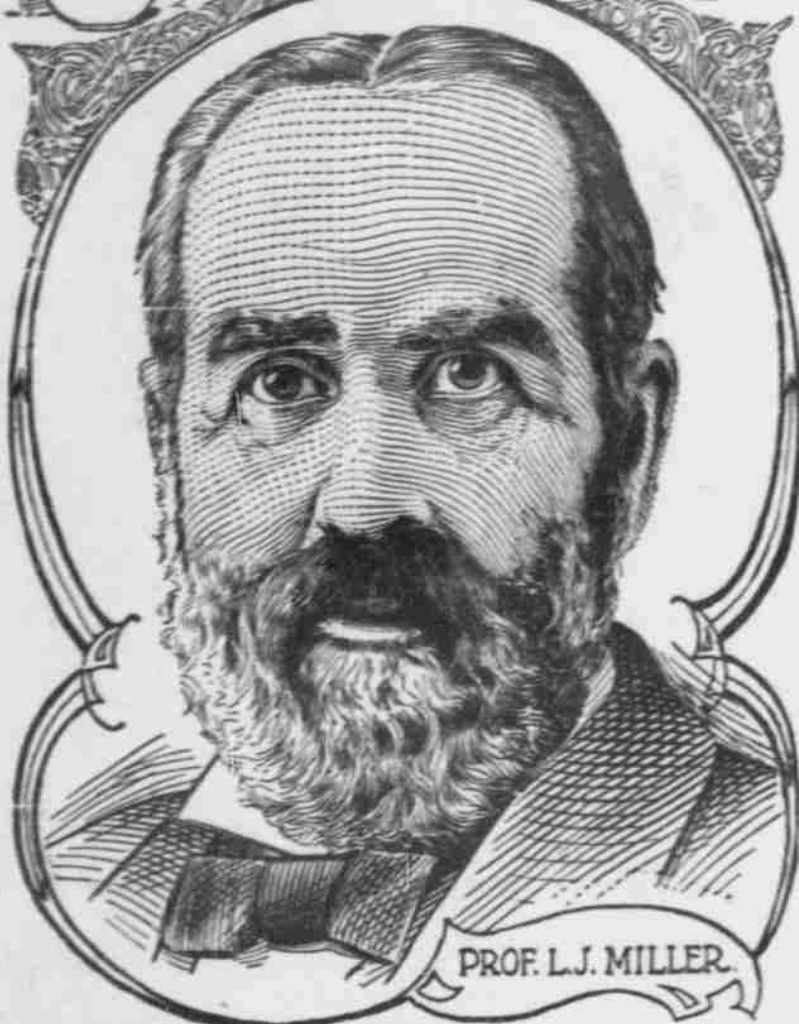
