OFFICER MURPHY CAPTURES

A Brace of Very Clever Burglars in Jerman's Store

Officer Murphy effected a clever capture of two burglars last night at the second-hand and furniture store of D. J. Jerman. About 9:15 he was passing in front of the store, when he noticed a form in interior. He hastened to the rear of the store, and as he arrived a man jumped through the glass in the back door. The officer had an ugly looking gun at the fellow's head in a second, and gave the command "hands up." It almost required a step ladder to reach the burglar's hands when he was being handcuffed, and he stood without resistance.

In the meantime Wm. Butte heard the noise, and commenced to blow a police whistle on Commercial street. Sheriff Culver and Deputy Minto were talking at the State street corner, and they came to the relief of the lone policeman, who was watching the back door, and holding the captive. The sheriff guarded the front door, while the deputy went to the rear and broke through the door.

The interior was very dark, but, armed with a small electric lantern, he commenced a search for the remaining burglar. He was joined by Ab. Magers, and the two investigated for several minutes without results. Finally Deputy Minto commanded the unseen thief to come out of hiding, threatening to blow the top of his head off, or otherwise injure him. It had the desired effect, and he came out from a pile of mattresses and surrendered.

The two were escorted to the county jail, where they were searched by the three officers. They had three revolvers, all empty second-hand bulldogs of the British and American patterns, four two-bladed pocket knives, a couple pair of scissors and a hypo gun, all taken from the store, together with a lot of plunder usually found on hoboes.

They were locked up for the night, and when they were behind the bars admitted their guilt to a Journal reporter, and asked how many years they would probably get for their folly. They are both Swedes, and gave their names as Ratsen Vibsen and Ed. Olsen. They had a Portland pawnbroker's card and had arrived in town less than 24 hours before they committed the crime.

Yesterday afternoon they visited the Jerman store, and sold some second-hand goods. The box was shipped from Canby, and it is said that the shipping receipt was procured from that place, and the crowd paid the freight at Salem and sold the goods.

They are undoubtedly old hands at the business, and Officer Murphy deserves great credit for the able manner in which he handled a very difficult situation, and the manner in which he captured the brace. He was ably assisted by the other gentlemen named, and Salem is fortunate in being rid of this gang.

When arraigned in Judge Judah's court this morning they entered a plea of guilty, and were bound over in \$1000 bail each to await the action of the circuit court. They will while away their spare moments in Hotel Culver, until court meets. They gave their names as Adolph Opson and Ed. Olson when arraigned this morning.

Iowa Organization Formed.

About twenty ex-Iowans met at the city hall Friday evening, and formed an Iowa organization.

F. N. Derby was made chairman, and a committee of three, including the chair, Colonel Page and A. F. Hofer, were appointed to draft forms of organization. Two hundred silk badges were ordered, with the words "Oregon-Iowa" printed on them. A committee, consisting of Messrs. Davey, Turner and Smith, were appointed to meet with the executive committee of the Roosevelt club, and tender the services of the Iowa organization in the reception in honor of Secretary Shaw, former governor of Iowa.

Adjourned to meet next Wednesday evening at same place. An effort will be made to hold a big Iowa day at the state fair this year.

Aged Man Dead.

Henry Kithart, of Stayton, was found dead in his cabin yesterday by Wm. King and Ben Downing. He was about 80 years old, and had a son living on the other side of the farm, but they did not agree very well. The farm is about three miles from Stayton, in Linn county.
