

OFFICER DANGEROUSLY WOUNDS BRAKEMAN

Marshal Beach of Newport Shoots J. D. Reed Through the Head While Arresting Him

Newport, Aug. 29.—City Marshal Beach yesterday afternoon shot and dangerously wounded F. C. Reed, a brakeman on the Corvallis & Eastern railroad. The bullet struck Reed in the neck just below the left ear, and ranged upward coming out through the right cheek. The chances for his recovery are very small.

The trouble first started between Jack Chiswell and Reed over a card game. The former is conducting a gambling house in a local saloon, and it was claimed by Reed that the games were unfair. Several hours after the first trouble the men met on the street, in front of the Bay View hotel. A few words followed, and they came to blows. Reed drew a pocket knife and

slashed Chiswell several times. One long cut in the wrist severed an artery, and he bled profusely. Chiswell was also knocked down and kicked in the head.

Marshal Beach tried to arrest Reed, and drew his revolver. Almost in an instant he fired, the bullet taking effect as above described. Fully 500 people were on the street at the time, and the excitement was intense.

Dr. Davis was called, and made a hurried examination of the wound. Reed was made as comfortable as possible, and taken to Albany where he is still alive. He had commenced working for the Corvallis & Eastern on August 12th, and is recently from the East.

GREAT ATHLETIC CONTEST

Entries From Almost Every Nation in the World

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 29.—The world's fair stadium, spacious though it is, was scarcely large enough to accommodate the thousands of spectators present today at the opening of the great Olympic games. The opening events were of a minor character, but the large number of participants and their splendid performances gave a good idea of what is in store for the remainder of the week, when the world's best athletes will compete in the Marathon race, the discus throw, the sprints and other events that make up the most remarkable programme of athletic events seen in modern times.

The entry list for these games, which have attracted the attention of nations, surpasses in number of contestants both of the previous meets of the kind, the first of which was held at Athens in 1896 and the second at Paris in 1900. The foreign countries represented include Germany, France, Greece, Italy, Canada, New Zealand, Australia, Switzerland, Hungary, Bohemia, the Transvaal, Scotland, Ireland, Cuba, Mexico, and Prince Edward's Island.

Of course the best entry list by far is that of America. Each district of the Amateur Athletic Union has sent its full quota of athletes, men who are trained to the hour and prepared to keep the Stars and Stripes flying from the flag pole from the sound of the gong today until the last event has been decided next Saturday. Among the American organizations represented are: Greater New York Irish Athletic Club, winners of the A. A. U. team championship for 1904; New York A. C., Chicago A. C., Maryland A. C., Milwaukee A. A., Louisville Y. M. C. A., Texas, New Orleans and Buffalo Y. M. C. A., Chicago University, Cornell University, Amherst College, University of Pennsylvania, Franklin Athletic Club of Cleveland, Missouri Athletic Club, and University of Colorado. Canada is strongly represented by a team from the Montreal A. C.

The greatest outside of the American teams is displayed in the Grecian representatives. These number nearly a dozen, and among them are four entries, which, according to the records contained in their entry blanks, bear witness to the fact that all competitors will be compelled to perform up to championship form to win. Foremost among the athletes from Greece is Demetrius Tofalos, who has records for lifting the bar bell and the dumb bell with one hand which are sufficient to keep the best men in the world worrying. In the discus throw there are two Grecian entries—Georgantios and Kakonis. Greece will also be well represented in the Marathon race to be run tomorrow.

Hungary has entered a team of six men—two for fencing, two for swimming and two for athletics. Germany also has a team of six men, while Ireland, France and England are represented by several of their stars.

America confidently expects to carry off all the honors in the track events. This confidence does not seem to be misplaced in view of the number of crack sprinters entered for the 60, 100 and 200 metre races. Included in

the list are Hahn, of Milwaukee, Robinson, of the Greater New York Irish Athletic Association, Hunter, of Louisville, Eaton, of Cambridgeport, Hogen, of Chicago, Walsh, of the New York Athletic Club, Peter, of Louisville, and Suediger and Abadie, of the Pacific Athletic Association. In the 400 metre race are Helman, of the New York Athletic Club, Behrens, of the Missouri Athletic Club, Moulton, of Kansas City, Osler, of Chicago, and Poage, of Milwaukee.

Outside of the track events the weights will attract more than ordinary interest when Flanagan, Rose, Plaw and Thomas come together. And again in the sixteen-pound shot, to be decided Wednesday, Rose, of Michigan, will meet Coe, the present world's record holder; Sheldon, Guiney and Hyde, of California. In the fifty-six pound weight contest Flanagan will again meet Desmarieau, the Canadian who beat him at the A. A. U. championships several years ago; Rose, Plaw, Johnson, and others.

Two excellent performers in the high hurdles will be brought together Thursday, Schule, of Milwaukee, and Scheideler, of Indiana University. In the pole vaulting the contestants will include Dvorka, of Chicago, Dole, of California, Samse, of Indiana, Durland, of Illinois, and Anderson, of New York.

In the discus throw there is another remarkable list of entries, including Sheridan, the present record holder; Flanagan, who broke the record in Louisville, in 1901; Rose, of Chicago, who is said to have thrown the weight 135 feet in practice, and the two Grecians, Georgantios and Kakonis. The great Marathon race will be run tomorrow. The distance is forty kilometers. In addition to the American entries for this event there are some of the fastest runners of France, Greece, Germany, and other European countries entered. South Africa has one entry and another of the contestants will be an Igorote from the Philippines.

David B. Hill Is Sixty-One.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 29.—David Bennett Hill, thrice governor of New York, once United States senator and at present one of Judge Parker's chief campaign managers, today entered upon his sixty-second year. For thirty-five years Mr. Hill has been in public life. He is most abstemious and carries his sixty-odd years very lightly. His friends sent him numerous congratulations today and not a few of them added a prediction that higher public honors are in store for him than any he has yet enjoyed.

Ohio State Fair.

Columbus, O., Aug. 29.—The city is rapidly filling with visitors to the Ohio state fair, which opened today for a season of five days. In every particular the present exhibition is up to the high standard set by the fairs of previous years. All departments are well filled with choice exhibits and the agricultural and industrial interests of the state. The entertainment features also are numerous and of a high class. The racing programme was inaugurated this afternoon under auspicious conditions.

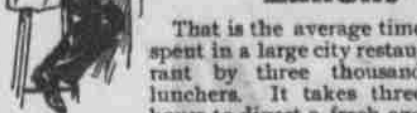

Chicago, Aug. 29.—The national executive board of the Butchers' Union met this morning at the Transit House to discuss the strike situation. It is claimed they are considering plans for a continuation of the strike, but the packers assert that they are planning to call the strike off. This is borne out by the fact that the butchers sent a sub-committee to visit the packers. The packers reported many desertions from the strikers' ranks this morning, with added application of strikers for re-employment in their old places. The situation seems to rest with the action of the teamsters, who are desirous of returning to work, and who tonight will vote on this proposition. Their return would eliminate the strikers' best support, and probably end the strike.

An Aurora View.

Marshal D. W. Gibson, of Salem, has commenced suit against the Capital Journal for damages in the sum of \$5000, because The Journal published an article dealing with Gibson's brutal treatment of a little dog that he was taking to the pound.
