DIVORCE TRIAL SHORT

Scandal Testimony Did Not Materialize in Madden Case

San Francisco, Aug. 29.—After a brief hearing Captain John Madden, U. S. A., was granted a divorce from Edith Partello Madden, the defendant failing to appear. The hearing was expected to develop into one of the greatest sensations in the history of the army, but only a few witnesses were examined, and the anticipated dragging of names high up in the army roster failed to materialize. Lieut Hector Robichon, recently dismissed from the army unbecoming a gentleman and officer, co-respondent in Mrs. Madden's cross-complaint mentioned many white and native women in the Philippines, but she failed to submit the evidence in support of her charges.

Big Auto Drive.

John H. Albert drove his touring car over from Newport, arriving in Salem at 11 o'clock. He left Newport Sunday at 9 a. m., stayed over night at King's valley, and made the run in less than a day and a half. Having no lanterns they laid over night, or they would have run through in a day. Two days driving on the beach convinces Mr. Albert that the auto is adapted to salt water summer resorts. The machine successfully climbed the Morrison hill, 2000 feet high, and came down it all right. Mechanist John Maurer took no headers on the trip coming back.

TERRIFIC JAPANESE ONSLAUGHT

Correspondent at Tokio says the Japanese have captured Anping, 12 miles southeast of Liao Yang, also Tanghoeng, 17 miles southeast of Liao Yang. The Russians abandoned Anping as soon as the Japanese advance guards appeared. They left large quantities of stores. From the reports of the scouts, 13 Russian divisions are in the lines about Liao Yang, making about 90,000 men. The Japanese occupied Anshanshan, which was evacuated by the Russians on Saturday.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 29.—General Kuropatkin reports that the whole Russian forces are now concentrated about Liao Yang. The Japanese under Generals Kuroki and Nodzu are united against the Russian left wing, while Oku is advancing on the Russian center and right wing.

Confirms First Report.

London, Aug. 29.—The Daily Mail's Kobe correspondent, in a dispatch, says:

"Following is the position of Port Arthur: The Japanese have captured all of the outlying fortifications, but the Russians still hold the citadel on on Antsashan, Golden Hill forts and the forts on Tiger's Tail and Liao-ti Mountain. The Japanese are in possession of the parade ground barracks under the Antsashan fort on the outskirts."

Isiatoun, (eleven miles east of Liao Yang.) August 29.—After fighting a rear guard action for nearly 10 minutes the Russian army from Anping dejected on a plain and brought up the

wounded and buried the dead on the way. Six guns are reported lost. A number of Japanese captured show signs of great fatigue from hardships.

PARKER WORKS ON LETTER

Esopus, Aug. 29.—Judge Parker declined to make a statement today regarding David B. Hill's expressed intention to retire from the political leadership of the party in his state on January 1st. He worked uninterruptedly today on his letter of acceptance. Wm. F. Sheehan left for New York this morning to resume work as chairman of the national committee.

COURT CONDEMNS CARGO

Shanghai, Aug. 29.—The steamer Arabia, from Oregon, which was seized by the Russian squadron, and taken to Vladivostok by a prize crew, arrived here this morning. She was tried by a prize court which condemned 2000 barrels of flour and some railroad car bodies. The balance of the cargo was ordered released. The Calchas, from Tacoma, which was also caught by the Russians and taken to Vladivostok, was in the latter port when the Arabia left. The flour and lumber on board were confiscated without waiting for the action of the prize court.
