FIGHT OVER SEWER

Madrid, Aug. 30.—A pitched battle is raging since Sunday last between the rival villages of Oyda and Fuentes, near Sargossa, over the ownership of a sewer, which both towns claim. Over 700 men are engaged in the fight, 28 already being dead and 79 injured. The police are powerless, and troops were dispatched to restore order.

Whale Birds Plenty.

Hoquiam, Wash., Aug. 30.—People along the bay front were treated to a rare sight yesterday, when a flock of whale birds, following a school of sardines, came up the harbor. The birds were so thick that the bay abreast of the Gray's Harbor mill was black, and they were seen coming up the bay as far as the eye could see. This is farther than the birds have ever come up the harbor before.

Lives In Albany.

A cousin of Judge Parker resides in Albany. Mr. W. P. Reed, residing on Ellsworth street, opposite the college, a citizen of Albany for two or three years, is a first cousin of the distinguished Democratic nominee for President of the United States. The mother of Mr. Reed and the father of Judge Parker were brother and sister. Both are now dead. Mr. Reed was born close to the Parker home, at Courtland, N. Y., where he spent his early boyhood, going from there to Wisconsin when he was nine or ten years old, but he has been back on a visit to the Parker home a number of times. Mr. Reed is a printer by trade, but is now working in Albert Brownell's nurseries. He is 60 years of age and has a family, a steady, reliable man. He has been independent in politics.—Albany Democrat.

Simala, Aug. 30.—It is understood that the terms of the British demands on Thibet are being settled in a most satisfactory manner. The British mission as a result, is likely to leave Lhasa at a much earlier date than expected.

Hillsboro, Aug. 30.—Arrived with a gun, through the assistance of some friend in this town Bert Oakman, the refugee murderer of Frank Bennett, was seen late yesterday four miles below Holbrook, on the Columbia river, nearly 20 miles from the scene of the tragedy Friday night. It was reported to the officials here today that a man attempted to stop Oakman, and was at once threatened with the weapon.

Against Free Library.

Eugene, Or., Aug. 30.—Suit was brought by W. T. Campbell to enjoin the city from purchasing the lot it was proposed to buy for the Carnegie library building. The complaint states that the lot was owned by one of the councilmen who voted for the sale, in violation of the provisions of the charter also that there are no funds on hand with which to pay for the lot, and under the charter the city has no right to contract the proposed indebtedness.
