MICROBES SCARE POLICE

Portland Doctor Makes Discovery That May Get Him Famous

Three captains of police, as many sergeants, several dozen of patrolmen and the hundreds of prisoners who annually find their way to the city jail, stand today in danger of losing their lives, says the Oregonian. The special instrument of death may be tuberculosis, smallpox, leprosy, yellow fever or the bubonic plague—and disease presided over and controlled by the amalgamated combine of microbes. One of these days some man will shuffle of the mortal coil, there will be an investigation, and the police committee of the executive board will be liable to face a charge of manslaughter. The horrible discovery was made yesterday by a physician who happened to visit the police station in the interests of a man who was seeing things. While the physician was there it happened that a prisoner was released, and the man of medicine watched the red tape process that is gone through every time a man is given his liberty after being incarcerated in the city bastille. The physician observed that the captain on duty removed from a certain drawer a canvas sack, that he took therefrom divers and sundry papers, coins, to bacco and all that had been in the prisoners' pockets when he was arrested. The physician stepped nearer to examine the canvas bag. Then he raised his hands in horror.

These canvas bags have been in use for nearly a year. When a prisoner is searched his effects are put in a bag, and there they stay until he is again at liberty. When the bags are thus emptied they are, perhaps in the same day, refilled with the property of another prisoner. As all classes of people find their way into the city jail, all kinds of property finds its way into the canvas bags. What yesterday held the effects of a filthy, besotted, diseased wretch, may today hold the property of a man of cleanliness arrested on suspicion, and when his property is returned there are returned with it microbes galore, who have been nesting in the canvas sack since the advent of the effects of the drunk. The bags are dirty and everything but pleasant to handle.

"Those canvas bags are infested with millions and millions of microbes," said the physician. "It is a wonder that every man who handles them is not dead. One of those bags could spread disease throughout the city and create an epidemic that would isolate Portland from the rest of the world. One man carries away the vermin on his personal papers and in his purse. He distributes coins that have been subjected to contact with the pest-tidden bag. The coins

spread disease, and in turn these people spread disease. And it all starts from the little canvas bag. Why don't you use manila envelopes and burn them every month. Then you would protect yourselves and the community in general."

The officers who were present at the time promised to think about it. They have visions of the great Chicago fire, caused by the kick of a cow, being relegated to the rear by the great Portland epidemic, caused by a canvas bag.

Political Paragraphs.

Under President's Roosevelt's administration the prestige of American diplomacy is recognized throughout the world.

Judge Parker says that the laws are sufficient but the failure to curb the trusts rests with "officials charged with the enforcement of the law." That reads like a slap at Grover Cleveland, when his record for enforcement of anti-trust laws is recalled.

Republicans propose to use patience, generosity and the helping hand in aiding the Filipinos to equip themselves for self-government. The Democrats propose to allow them to return to the rule of the bolo.

The same party that is denouncing President Roosevelt as a "War Lord" today denounced Abraham Lincoln as a tyrant and an enemy of the Republic forty years ago.

Judge Parker admits that his election would mean a four years' conflict between a Democratic President and a Republican senate, with the prospect that no desirable legislation could be enacted. Do the people want such a change?

Democrats admit that the Republican policies have proved beneficial to the country but they want the privilege of administering them.

In commending the Republican policies which his party has so strenuously opposed in former campaigns, Judge Parker tacitly admits he is glad the candidate for whom he voted went down to defeat.

President Roosevelt has not found it necessary to revise his party's platform. It was written for him in the record of Republican achievements.

The gold standard of currency can never be "irrevocably" fixed until the Democratic party in convention assembled, endorses the Republican record and agrees not to attempt to tinker with it. That action has not been taken.

Meets at The Dalles.

The Dalles, Or., Aug. 30.—Many delegates from Eastern Oregon and Washington have gathered here for the annual session of the Columbia River M. E. conference. The conference formally opens this evening with an address by Rev. I. F. Roach, D. D. of Boise, Idaho. The business session begins to-morrow morning. During the week there will be sermons and addresses by several noted divines.
