American printers at Las Vegas, New Mexico, are well organized, but the Spanish printers have not yet taken advantage of organization.

WOMEN PASSED MUSTER

But Cannot Serve Because of Uniform Regulations

Postmaster McKay, of Des Moines, Iowa, is in a quandary, with difficulties closing in and around him and extrication is becoming more and more difficult. Being imbued with the deepest faith in women, Postmaster McKay invited a number of the women folk of his town to enter into the class of competitors for the position of letter carriers, there being three vacancies to be filled in his bailiwick. The response was prompt. More than that, the women excelled the mere men in the matter of examinations under the rules of the civil service, and the names of three were duly forwarded to Washington.

Not being able to distinguish the sex by the initials attached to the names, but being much impressed with the remarkably high averages of the three, Postmaster General Payne approved the appointments and they were made accordingly. But at that point—or, rather, at the point of Des Moines—the difficulties began to cloud the horizon, and the women to cluster around and about unhappy Postmaster McKay. The reason and the cause thereof were plain.

Those Trousers.

The regulations of the postal service require letter carriers to wear gray coat, gray vest and—here's the rub—gray trousers.

All other conditions had been met and found cheerful and willing compliance on the part of the three sweet girl applicants. Even that portion of the physical examination to be taken by an applicant for the position of carriers requiring him to hop twelve times on one foot without touching the other to the floor had been met, and, in fact, the hopping of the trio was declared to be perfect. The rub is in the requirement that letter carriers shall wear trousers—trousers of gray, and no law of the Medes and Persians was ever insisted upon more stringently.

What Will He Do?

What is the postmaster to do? The three applicants claim, with equal and exact justice, that never would they have applied for the position if McKay had called their attention to the trouser regulation, and they shake their application, their certificates of examination and their appointments at him. In return he waves aloft three pair of gray trousers and bids defiance to the enemy. The spectacle of three little girls in gray delivering and collecting letters and postals would be a sight indeed, and a relief from the spectacle of rough men with beards and an air of immense knowledge—but three little girls in gray trousers! However, it is expected that at last the girls will give up hoping, and devote themselves to demonstrating just what a mean old thing Postmaster McKay can be when he tries.

For Bantam Weight Title.

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 31.—The six-round contest between "Frankie" Neil and "Tommy" Murphy, to be held tonight before the National Athletic Club, promises to be an interesting affair and will decide the bantam-weight championship of the world. Neil, the present holder of the title, is apparently not in fear of the result. Murphy, who has just graduated from the amateur class, is considered in New York to be a wonder, having a clean record, and having bested men considerably heavier than himself. His backers believe that he will make Neil step lively at the start and eventually win. The fight will be witnessed by a large delegation of sporting men from New York.

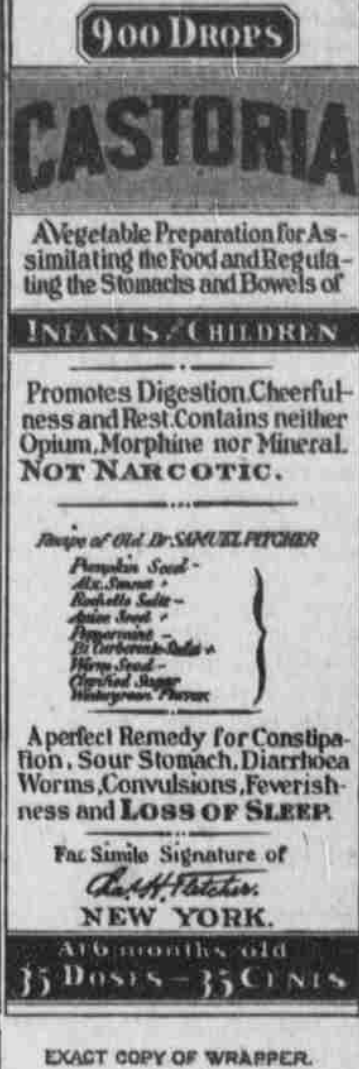
