ANOTHER BANKING HOUSE

Col. L. K. Page and Associates will Open a New Institution

It is now known that Salem is to have another banking institution in the near future, and it is believed by those who know the moving spirits in the matter that it will be an institution that will prove a credit and a great benefit to our community. The new concern will be incorporated under the laws of Oregon, and will be known as the Salem State Bank, with a capital stock of \$50,000. It is not yet known where the concern will be located, nor who will be its officers, except that it is assumed that Col. L. K. Page will be its president.

It has been well known that ever since Colonel Page came to Salem that he has had an eye on the town with a banking business in view. It soon became known that he had had considerable experience in that line, and it has also come to the surface that he is amply able to go into the business. He has been importuned by many of Salem's best business men to associate himself with them in a business of this kind, but he has been conservative, and not moved until he felt thoroughly satisfied that it was the thing to do.

Colonel Page was seen by a Journal representative and discussed the situation quite freely. He is frank to admit that he considers Salem an excellent point to enter the business, and says he has assurances of business for the new concern that already insures its success. Salem has had as high as five banks, and all of them made money. Now there are only two to transact all this business. There they are strong concerns, and a credit to any city, the new concern believes there is room for another without encroaching upon the business of those already here. Salem is the natural business center of the richest valley in the world, and is rapidly growing, and to take the benefit of this growth is the purpose of the new concern.

Col. Page very frankly discussed the situation, and says that, while his concern will have a capital of only \$50,000, the men back of it are amply able to increase its capital as business requires it, even to the amount of five or ten times its original stock. They propose to do a conservative business and feel their way, growing with the expanding tendency of the state, and always being within the limits of what is termed safe banking. He goes on the old-fashioned theory of doing one thing at a time, and doing it right. He believes that if a banker knows his business the bank will always be safe, for he will either have the money or the securities which are more than good for the money.

Mr. Page could not yet state who would be cashier of the new concern, as he has several men under consideration both home and new material. He is confident that the new bank will be able to select a good man out of the timber at hand, and says he hopes to be able to transact business in a manner that will be acceptable to the business public of Salem. As the new location and the bank's officers are finally agreed upon the public will be fully informed.
