St. Louis, Sept. 12.—The first session of the international Parliamentary Union, for the promotion of international arbitration, was held this morning in the Hall of Festivals at the fair. Congressman Richard Bartholdi was elected president, and delivered the opening address, dwelling on the importance of the work of the union for the preservation of the world's peace.

Martini and his son were at work picking hops in Herren's yard. Martini lost his temper over something his son had done. When Wollman came upon him, the pastor had tied his boy up against the fence, and was beating him mercilessly. Wollman interposed. Martini drew a revolver and fired twice. As Wollman fell wounded the pastor mounted a bicycle standing near and fled.
