Reading, Pa., Sept. 21.—The annual convention of the Pennsylvania State League of Republican Clubs began at the Academy of Music here today and will continue through tomorrow. Several hundred delegates, representing more than one hundred clubs, were in attendance. The day's proceedings were largely of a routine nature. The services begun at 10:30 o'clock. The church edifice was crowded, and the greatest interest was manifested in the proceedings, which were the most elaborate of the kind ever seen here. The consecration ceremony was performed by Archbishop Keene, who was assisted by several bishops and a large number of priests.

SALEM ELKS ARE INVITED

Salem lodge, No. 336, B. P. O. New York, Sept. 21.—The United States civil service commission held an examination in this city today for the position of "stitch counter," which is the most difficult place to fill in the whole civil service. A stitch counter is expected to count the stitches per square inch in imported lace and embroidery with a view to fixing the ad valorem duty. The position pays \$900 a year and the work is done with a magnifying glass.
