MORGAN'S TRAIN WRECKED

Distinguished Guests Receive a Severe Shaking Up

Worcester, Sept. 21.—J. P. Morgan's special train, bearing the financier, the Archbishop of Canterbury and other distinguished guests, was almost wrecked between Brookfield and North Brookfield at 7 o'clock this morning, by striking a switching engine. The engine was knocked off the track, and Engineer Merrill and the foreman of the switching engine were seriously injured. Beyond a severe shaking up, none of the Morgan party were injured. The track was cleared, and the special proceeded at 9:30 o'clock.

CRANKS CALL ON CHIEF

Washington, Sept. 22.—Two cranks attempted to see President Roosevelt today. One claimed that he was Senator Dick, of Ohio, but he proved to be Charles Barth, an Ohio man. The other was Mathias Stewart, of Boston, Mass. He said she had come to see the President regarding the transportation of negro cotton pickers to the cotton fields. Both were arrested.

MANY OFFSPRING PRESENT

St. Louis, Sept. 22.—If five hundred people, 100 of whom are descendants of the two famous explorers attended the Lewis and Clark exercises at the Oregon building today, Mrs. Carolyn Douglas, a granddaughter of Lewis, was present.

Train Into Dynamite

Cumberland, Md., Sept. 22.—A Baltimore & Ohio freight train into a load of dynamite at North Branch, eight miles from here this afternoon. The explosion blew up the tower house, and eight are reported killed and 15 injured. A special with physicians has gone to the scene. The dynamite was being used in the construction of the Wabash road.

Desperate Over Death

Pueblo, Colo., Sept. 22.—Charles H. Dolly, a wealthy resident of Pueblo, and a mine owner at Cripple Creek, committed suicide this morning by blowing his brains out. He was despondent over his wife's death.

The board finds the officers and crew were responsible for the catastrophe in which 909 lives were lost. The board revoked the license of Captain VanSchoonick, Edward VanWart, pilot, and Benj. F. Conklin, engineer.

YORK STATE HOPS

The New York state hop market, according to the Waterville Times, is in good condition. It says:

"The hop harvest is now completed, and the crop has been secured in fine shape. The weather was exceptionally good. The crop was large for the acreage, and all of excellent quality. The market is strong at 30 cents, and many growers are selling until it is estimated that half of the crop of Oneida and Madison counties has already been sold. Thirty cents is the prevailing price, but a shade better has been paid for a few lots."

Crop Conditions

The monthly report of the chief of the bureau of statistics of the department of agriculture will show the condition of crops on September 1 to have been 84.5, as compared with 87.3 last month, 81.1 on September 1, 1903, 84.3 at the corresponding date in 1902 and a ten year average of 79.4.

The average condition of spring wheat was 81.5. This being the first time that spring wheat has been separately reported upon on September 1, the only comparison that can be made is with the condition one month ago, which was 77.5. The condition in the five principal states is reported as follows: Minnesota, 89; North Dakota, 82; South Dakota, 59; Iowa, 66, and Washington, 59. A decline during the month of 15, 27, 29, 15 and 1 points, respectively.

The average condition of the oat crop on September 1 was 81.4, against 86.8 last month, 57.7 on September 1, 1903, 87.2 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten year average of 84.8.

The average condition of barley on September 1 was 87.4, against 88.1 on August 1, 1904, 82.1 on September 1, 1903, 88.7 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten year average of 82.1.

The average condition of rye on September 1 was 86.3, against 84.1 on September 1, 1903, 90.3 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten year average of 85.4.

The average condition of buckwheat on September 1 was 91.5, against 92.5 one month ago, 81.9 on September 1, 1903, 84.4 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten year average of 85.8.

The average condition of flax on September 1 was 55.8, as compared with 78.9 one month ago, and 80.5 on September 1, 1903.

The average condition of potatoes on September 1 was 91.8, against 94.1 one month ago, 84.3 on September 1, 1903, 89.1 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten year average of 77.3.

Of the thirteen principal clover seed-producing states, four, namely, Wisconsin, Colorado, Utah and California, report increased acreages, while all the other principal states report decreases. In Indiana, Iowa, and Colorado, conditions are below their ten year averages, while all the other principal states report conditions above such average.

The number of stock hogs now being fattened is 2.4 per cent less than the number one year ago. Reports as to size and weight of stock hogs indicate a condition of 94.1, as compared with 95.1 one year ago, and a seven year average of 94.3.

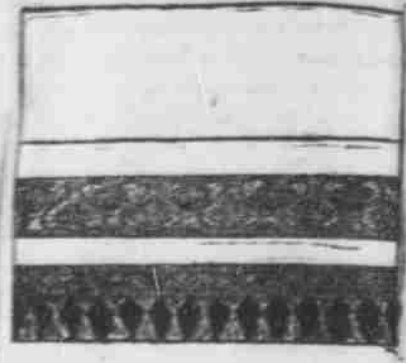

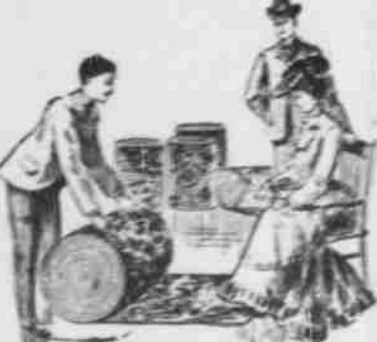

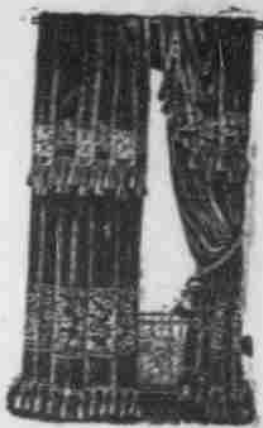
