## OFFICIAL FIGURES TAKEN

As the Basis of Labor Commissioner Hoff's Estimates

Newspapers generally throughout the state are commenting upon the population figures made up in the office of State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff. A Portland paper says that no one will accept them as correct, while a Lane county editor challenges the figures as misleading, and says that Commissioner Hoff is away off. The truth of the matter is that the figures are not those of the Commissioner Hoff, but are those of the United States census officials, school officers and election judges and clerks. Mr. Hoff says that something is wrong, and lays no claim to the state having more or less population than the figures stated. Take Marion county, for example. The census of 1900 gives the county a population of 27,713. The school census of that year gives the county a population of 9775 persons of school age. In 1904 there were 10,226 persons reported, or an increase of 451 persons in four years. Using this rate of increase the figures give Marion county a population of 28,991. Taking the vote on supreme judge in 1900 and 1904 the former year shows 5245 votes were cast in Marion county for that office, and in 1904 there were 5533 votes cast, an increase of 288, showing a population of 29,234. In 1900 there were 6384 children enrolled in the public schools of Marion county, and in 1904 there were 5804 enrolled, a decrease of 580 in four years. Estimating the population on this enrollment, the county has 25,195 people. In 1900 the attendance at school was 4570, and in 1904 the number is 4323, or a decrease of 247, giving a total population on this basis of 26,212. It will thus be noticed that on one way of estimating the population it shows 28,991, another 29,234, another 25,195, while another gives it 26,212. This makes a difference of 4039 between the highest and the lowest estimate. By adding the figures obtained as a result of these four different compilations and dividing by four an average of 27,408 is obtained. Commissioner Hoff has simply taken the figures that have been accepted as official, and shown that if these figures are correct they make the population of the several counties to be as recently published. He has proven one thing and that is that there are large numbers of children in school who are not. Are they working during school time, and violating the child labor law? This concerns the labor commissioner. Right here in Marion county the official figures show that nearly 1000 children who ought to be in school are elsewhere.
