

## APPLE SHIPMENTS ACTIVE

### Salem Fruit Going South and North as Far as Alaska

Salem apple shipments are going thousands of miles north and south. Frank Davis, for Page & Sons, of Portland, has just sent a carload to Dawson, Alaska, and two carloads to Los Angeles. There is a greater demand for Oregon apples than ever before.

## LANDON DROWNING DETAILS

Louis W. Landon, aged 19, employed by the Melton Manufacturing Company, was drowned a few miles above Cazadero Sunday morning, while attempting to cross the Clackamas river to get a better vantage of fishing ground, says the Oregonian. The body had not been recovered up to a late hour last night, though the river below the riffles was being dragged by relatives and interested persons.

Young Landon had only been in the city a short time, having come from Salem, where his parents reside, and taken up his residence with F. E. Ross at 503 Gantenbein avenue.

In company with Mr. Ross, Landon went to Estacada Saturday night and camped in a bunk house, in order to get an early start Sunday morning, he being an ardent fisherman. Ross and Landon proceeded to Cazadero bright and early, but decided to cross the river before casting their lines. Ross took the lead, but the water was so swift that he warned Landon to keep further up stream, as there were some deep holes below. Evidently Landon failed to comply with the advice, for he was swept by the current into a deep hole. Almost at the same time Ross lost his footing and slipped into deep water. Ross quickly gained the main shore and held out his fishing pole toward Landon, who was swimming toward him.

Suddenly the young man sank just as he reached for the pole. Ross endeavored to locate his companion, but the current was so swift that he could do nothing alone.

Word was sent to the city at once and early yesterday morning a special car was chartered by a number of the young man's friends and grappling hooks taken to the place of his disappearance. Mr. Ross has offered \$25 for the recovery of the body, and \$25 more has been offered by the young man's father, who is at the scene of the accident.

Young Landon is said to have been an exemplary youth, with friends everywhere, he has been, and his sudden end is deplored by many.
