MANY SILOS BUILT

Western Oregon Very Well Adapted For Use of Ensilage

The whirr of the ensilage cutter is heard in the land, and is about as much in evidence as the thrashing machine. These machines cut and elevate into the silos from five to ten tons per hour, and our soil produces from eight to ten tons per acre of green corn ensilage, that makes the finest dairy ration that has been discovered.

Owing to absence of freezing weather, and the great heat in summer, western Oregon is naturally a great ensilage country. The ensilage does not heat or sour here as it does where there is freezing in winter and the mercury up in the nineties in summer. Three Salem carpenters have been employed most of the fall building silos hereabouts—E. L. Briggs, Wm. Pettit and Henry Schultz. They built two silos for the Minto Brothers on the island, one 16 feet high and one 24 feet high, and both 11 feet in diameter. Another was built on the Lon Wain place, south of Salem, 24 feet high and 12 feet in diameter, holding 60 tons. These silos are on a cement foundation. It takes three men about two days to build a large silo—one of the sixty ton size.
