SENATOR FULTON DESERVES CREDIT.

A local writer assails the statement of Senator Fulton that the constitution alone fixes the qualifications of voters.

Of course, any one with a knowledge of constitutional law knows that the legislature can not take away rights which the voter has under the constitution.

The school boy studying civil government learns that the legislature, being a creature of the constitution, can not deny privileges which the citizen enjoys by virtue of the constitution.

So we are informed that the "Constitution only provides the qualifications of voters at general elections." The primary election not being a "general election," it is argued, it does not come under the constitutional provisions.

Is this information correct? The constitution provided for some elections in specific terms and then goes on to say that:

"IN ALL ELECTIONS NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR IN THIS CONSTITUTION," certain persons called citizens "SHALL BE ENTITLED TO VOTE AT ALL ELECTIONS AUTHORIZED BY LAW."

At all elections otherwise provided for than by the constitution all shall be entitled to vote who are citizens under the constitution. Can there be anything plainer than this?

In White vs. County Commissioners, 12th Ore., 309, Section 2, Art. II, of the constitution is thus construed by the supreme court:

THIS SECTION PRESCRIBES THE QUALIFICATIONS OF ELECTORS, AND THE LEGISLATURE CAN NOT ADD OTHERS."

Of course, if the primary election is not an election, if holding it under the election laws and the election officers of the state does not make it an election, the constitution has no bearing.

But the clear intention of the legislature was to safeguard the primary election for the purpose of making nominations, so that to all intents and purposes it should be an election.

If it is not to be an election, with all the exacting and protection of the constitution and the election laws of the state thrown about it, it is not worth having on the statute books. If it is to be an election it must conform to the constitution and can not set up new qualifications for electors.

There is no locus in quo process by which the creature of the constitution can be set up on a par with or super-

ior to the organic law of the state. It has been often attempted but never can succeed.

Senator Fulton deserves credit for bravely exposing a bad law, no matter if it was intended to serve a good cause. The men who draft such laws may mean well, but they always do harm to the cause.

VOTERS SLOW TO REGISTER

Very few voters are registering under the new direct primary law, as the majority registered for the June election, and it is not necessary to re-register. Only 24 new names are on County Clerk Roland's book, and out of the 24 only one is a Democrat, the rest being Republicans. No one as yet has taken advantage of the clause allowing the voter to register without politics. Following is the registration by precincts:

Republican—Brooks, 1; Chemawa, 2; Liberty, 4; Macleay, 1; Salem, No. 1, 1; Salem No. 2, 4; Salem No. 3, 1; Salem No. 4, 5; Salem No. 5, 2; Salem No. 6, 1; East Salem, 1.
Democrat—Salem No. 6, 1.

flow above the Waller dam in March is 239 cubic feet per second, on the testimony of a hydraulic engineer in a suit a few years ago. That is a flow of 154,862,000 gallons daily. Deducting the one million gallons per day taken by the state, there would be left a daily flow of 76,951,500 gallons for each of the ditches. What water power that would develop would depend on the water wheels used. It is recalled that the North Mill ditch was built very large, so as to accommodate a large wooden mill that was to have been built on the two acres adjoining the brick mills on the south.

Fred Hurst, who was at one time part owner of this water power, says it is one of the finest and most valuable water powers in the state, and he has no interest in the matter now. He thinks it would be worth twice what is asked for it in any other city in the West. He has no reason to be especially friendly to Mr. Wilcox.

John G. Wright, who has had a great deal of experience in state institutions, some of which make their own light, says the city can make its own electric lights, and burn wood, and save 50 per cent on its present lighting bills.
