Mass., Oct. 1.—From Maine to California and from all the intervening prominent Episcopal dioceses and laymen are journeying toward Boston to attend the annual general convention of the Episcopal church, which begins its sessions in Trinity church in this city next Wednesday. The presence of the Archbishop of Canterbury would in itself make the coming convention one of unusual note aside from the extraordinary importance of some of the subjects which are to be considered and acted upon.

The general convention is divided into two bodies—the house of bishops and the house of deputies. The house of deputies is composed of clergy and laymen, who are elected by the various annual diocesan conventions.

The question of change of name of church will probably cause some discussion. It is regarded by many as the matter has been practically settled for the time being, however, by the vote of the dioceses, the majority having opposed a change from the present title, the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.
