PUBLIC OWNERSHIP DISCUSSED

(Continued from first page.)

A. A. Lee said public ownership had not been a success in small places. He lived in the east part of the city, and they had neither light or water. He believed the city should acquire a plant at the earliest possible moment, and put light and water in reach of all.

John Bayne said all seemed to favor public ownership of a light plant, although there had been great improvement in the service. He believed the city had best water service it ever had. He had visited the crib, and his appetite for Salem water had been improved. No effort at regulation had so far been successful, as the corporations had ways of evading the attempts of the city council. Still he would try both. The time for the city to act was when the water power could be had, and he believed the offer made to the city should be accepted, as water powers all over the valley are being picked up.

R. R. Ryan said in no case where a city of 10,000 or over had ever taken up public ownership had ever been a failure. He cited a number of cities where the cost of light had been reduced one-half to one-third. Like the other speakers, every point made for public ownership was heartily applauded.

W. A. Cusick spoke in an able and convincing manner for a better lighted city. He favored a committee of business men to take up this whole question, and go to the bottom of it. He believed the city had the ability and the power to do as well or better than a private corporation could do. He would not act hastily, but he believed in getting hold of the right end of the club, and proceeding to acquire a plant, if necessary to protect the interests of the city.

J. L. Stockton talked on a similar line, using great moderation, not agreeing with Dr. Cusick about the streets being well lighted. He complimented the present management of the electric light plant, as it had improved matters 50 per cent. He complimented the audience on the fine business spirit it had manifested, and commented on the good spirit of all the discussion. It was the right way to go at these things and he believed great good would come of it. On motion a committee of three was appointed to take such action as was best deemed in the interest of the city, and report at a future meeting. The following were nominated and appointed: Dr. W. A. Cusick, J. L. Stockton and E. Hofer. Adjourned.
