Fairbanks-Dolliver Political Meeting in Portland Tonight

HUNTERS REPORT LUCK

Like a Fourth of July celebration was the sound of the popping of guns in the stubble fields throughout the Willamette valley today.

From midnight last night until daylight this morning was to be seen one long procession of hunters on their way to the fields. Only a few of them have returned as yet, but they say that the birds are very tame, and that there are as many if not more than there were last season. Most of the birds are full grown, but some of the last broods are rather small yet. Jack Ryan and Dr. Frank Smith returned before noon with eight birds. Lloyd Hauser was out for a short time in the early morning, returning at 7 o'clock with five, E. L. Shubard, of the Honeyman Hardware Company, of Portland, returned about 2 o'clock with nine, and some few are back whose names were not learned.

INDIANS ON WAR PATH

Seattle, Oct. 1.—One thousand whiskey-crated Indians have terrorized the western part of San Juan island, and calls for outside help have been made by frightened whites. The revenue cutter Grant has been asked to deprive the Indians of whiskey, and to force them across the border into British Columbia, where they belong. Until the Grant arrives there will be no protection for the dozen little settlements along the shore of San Juan, facing Vancouver Island. The report says that outrages and violence are momentarily expected. The attitude of the Indians is so threatening that many whites have fled from their homes. The warlike party comprises about 1000 bucks and their families.

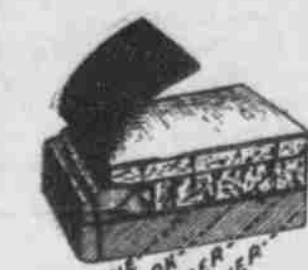

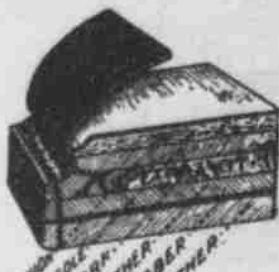


Style 1.

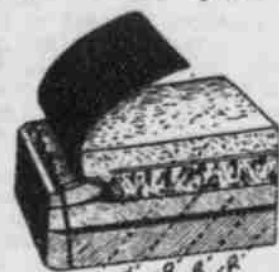
