

WOMEN WRECK STORE

A New York dispatch says:

A 5 and 10-cent store in Harlem advertised yesterday as follows: "Ten cents worth of goods for 5 cents; 20 cents worth for 10 cents."

The sale was to be for today only. The advertisement proved a winner, for by 10 o'clock about 1000 women were gathered in front of the store. They were packed against the doors, covered the sidewalks and extended half way across the street. The only man in the gathering was a policeman.

When the manager of the store appeared and surveyed the gathering he became frightened, and locked the door. Immediately the front doors were smashed and glass and pieces of merchandise were strewn on the floor. Nothing could stop the onslaught of women who poured into the store. For some time after the first rush was made women with all sorts of articles in their arms and with shopping bags crammed with merchandise were constantly going along the streets taking the plunder home.

When the police reserves arrived the storm had passed. The reserves found the one policeman at the back of the store. His helmet was gone, his coat was torn completely off, his nose was bleeding. He had telephoned to the station, and was helplessly surveying the ruins around him.

H. P. Whitney for Congress.

New York, Oct. 3.—A majority of the Tammany congressmen are slated for renomination at the Democratic congress district convention tonight. The chief interest centers in the Thirtieth district, which is now represented by Francis Burton Harrison, the nominee for lieutenant-governor. It is said that Harry Payne Whitney may receive the nomination in this district. "Big Tim" Sullivan, of the Eighth district; Henry M. Goffgale, of the Ninth; William Sulzer, of the Tenth; William R. Hearst, of the Eleventh; and W. Bonrke Cochran, of the Twelfth district, will accept renominations. Iro Edgar Rider will not be renominated in the Fourteenth district, where Charles A. Towne will become the party candidate.

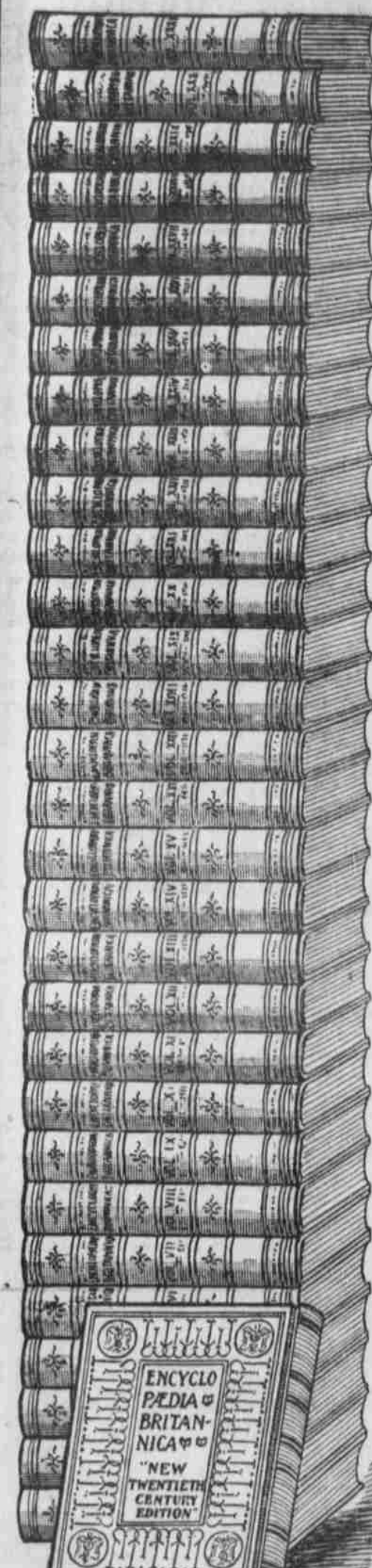
Judge Parker may be a very proper gentleman, but there are people who never will be convinced that it does not take a long spoon to eat with David B. Hill.

It will suit you and also your frow.

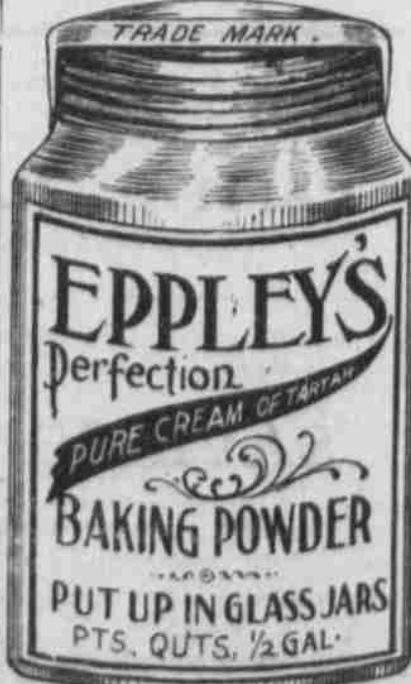
