

## CITY COUNCIL BUSY

City council met in regular session last night. It was a business session, and many matters were brought before the "city dads" for action.

A new street grade was ordered established on Court street from 12th to Mill street.

On motion of Alderman Gesner a committee of three, including the mayor, was appointed to confer with the county courts of Marion and Polk counties regarding the placing of electric lights on the bridge Alderman Gesner and Churchill were named.

A board walk six feet wide was ordered constructed on the west side of Commercial street in front of the old Dearborn and Bozarth property.

Grade ordered changed in front of the blind school, in order that a cement sidewalk can be constructed.

New sidewalk ordered on Cottage street from McElroy's corner to the creek.

The committee on sewers was instructed to ascertain the cost of automatic flush tanks to place on the Court, Ferry and Marion-street sewers.

Alderman Downing reported that the Citizen's Light & Traction Company had offered to furnish 60 electric arc lights for \$5.95 each per month, on a five-year contract, and moved that a committee of three, including the mayor, be appointed to draw an ordinance and contract in accordance with the report of the committee. Alderman Acheson seconded the motion, and it prevailed. Mayor Waters appointed Aldermen Downing and Young on the committee.

S. M. Wright, watchman at Salem woolen mill, was appointed special officer without pay.

Motion for a 6-foot sidewalk on State street, from Mill creek to city limits.

Petition of S. Friedman, to be allowed to sell his stock of goods at public auction voted down.

Application of J. L. Stockton & Co. for permission to suspend an advertising banner across street was referred to the committee on streets with power to act.

Fire Chief Pugh reported that certain alleys were blockaded and trash was being burned.

The new health ordinance was introduced and read once. It contains 14 pages of typewritten matter, and provides many things necessary and otherwise.

The recorder was instructed to issue a warrant for the arrest of George F. Rogers, charged with keeping the alley in the rear of the city hall blockaded. Alderman Bayne objected to the action, and stated that it was a piece of folly for the officers to rush up to the council every time that they desired to arrest any person. Recorder Judah felt aggrieved at the remarks of the councilman, but Mr. Bayne reiterated his complaint, and the incident closed.

The ordinance committee was instructed to draft a special ordinance covering the handling of wood in the streets and alleys.

Motion for sidewalk on Front street alongside of block 2 in Smith's addition was adopted.

The street commissioner was instructed to notify the Salem Milling Company to cover the North Front street ditch or the city would do so at the expense of the property.

## DAIRY BARN BURNS

The Schindler Bros. cattle barn was burned this morning, entailing a loss of \$1800. The fire started at 8:30 o'clock and destroyed the barn, about 110 tons of hay and 800 bushels of oats. The alarm was sounded at about 8:45, and Chief Pugh and his men made a fine run with one engine and the hose wagon, and arrived in time to save the dwelling from destruction.

The fire probably was caused by a tramp who slept in the barn last night, as he emerged from the building early this morning, and it is thought that he lighted a cigarette while in the barn.

Emanuel and Jacob Schindler conduct the Fairmount dairy, and the loss is a heavy one on them. Their entire winter's feed was in the building, and the insurance carried by them was only \$900.

The fire department made one of the prettiest runs ever witnessed in the city, the horses hauling the heavy apparatus over the South Commercial street hills at break-neck speed.

This is the first fire to occur in the seventh ward since it was admitted to the city, and had it not been part of Greater Salem the Schindler residence also would undoubtedly be burned, and, owing to the slight wind that was blowing very probably one of the worst fires in the history of Salem would have resulted.

Father Dollarhide has been a pioneer preacher for over half a century, either in the local ranks or engaged in the active ministry.

His aged wife, four sons and numerous grandchildren survive him, six daughters and two sons have preceded him to the eternal world.

The new issue will make the total capital stock \$142,500,000, of which \$110,000,000 will be common stock.
