



C. P. R. Stock Issue.

Montreal, Quebec, Oct. 5 .- At their unual meeting today the stockholders of the Canadian Pacific Railway voted to anthorize the proposed increase of \$25,500,000 in capital stock. The actual increase is not to be made all at once, but will be issued from time to time for improvements and corporate purposes. The new issue will make the total capital stock \$142,500,000, of which \$110,000,000 will be common stock.

Ottawa, Ill., Oct. 5 .- The survivors of the 53d Illinois infantry, Ford's infantry and Coggawell battery (Cushman's brigade) held their tweetieth annual reunion here today in celebration of the anniversary of the battle of the Hatchie river, in which they took prominent part.
