GARDEN ROAD CARS

New Service on the Stub Line From Asylum Avenue Store

A laudable effort is being made by the management of the street car system to resume operations on the Garden Road line. There has been a great demand on the part of residents in that section for this service, and Manager Welch has decided to test the matter out once more, therefore a car has been placed on that line to run from Asylum avenue to the Garden road, connecting with the asylum car every trip. He says if this "stub" line can be made to pay operating expenses it will be continued indefinitely, and he hopes that it may even be developed into a paying line.

It will be remembered that when this line was built and a track laid from Asylum avenue to the fair grounds the expense was practically met by the residents of that section, and for this reason, if none other, they feel especially interested in having this service resumed. The receipts for the first two days hardly justify the operation of the car, but Manager Welch hopes that it will develop sufficiently to make it possible to maintain this service. If this is done, the proposition to take up that piece of track in order to lay it to Morningside will probably be abandoned, and the residents of that section correspondingly gratified. Under all the circumstances, it is hoped that this line will be continued to be operated, and the Morningside extension made as contemplated.

CITY PRIMARY ELECTION

Will Be Held Under Method Used Last Year

The Republican city central committee met last night at the office of H. A. Johnson to consider plans for holding the city primaries. Those present were E. M. LaFore, chairman; H. A. Johnson, A. Gesner, F. T. Wrightman, A. T. Wain, A. Daue, T. J. Cronise and John Knight.

It was decided by the committee to hold the primaries under the old law, and it was ordered that all who desired to become candidates for the various offices to be filled at the election this fall should file their petition with the city committee on or before November 12th, at 8 o'clock p. m. of said day.

Petitions nominating candidates for mayor, recorder, marshal and treasurer must contain 50 names, and for aldermen 20 names of Republican voters. Robert A. Crossan acted as secretary of the meeting.

The date for the primaries was set for November 15th, and the polls will be open from 2 o'clock to 7 o'clock p. m. Nominating petitions for precinct committeemen will require 10 names.
