THE RIGHT DIRECT PRIMARY.

The city of Salem will by mere resolution of the city Republican committee nominate a full city ticket by the direct primary.

That was done last year, and gave this city a good city government. It will be done again, and that without a word of legislation.

Thus do real political institutions grow. OUT OF THE NECESSITIES OF THE PEOPLE to have good government.

The U'Ren law may come or go, may be voted up or down. The direct primary is possible, and holds its own as an institution.

Political institutions are the result of slow evolutions, growths from within the common practices and customs of the people.

Legislation can only recognize these practices, and formulate them into more orderly and uniform proceedings, as statutes do the common law.

There is nothing today, without the U'Ren law, to prevent the party committee in any city or county ordering a simple and inexpensive direct primary.

There is much in the U'Ren law to make direct nomination impossible and obnoxious to the people. That measure, as Judge Waldo pointed out before election, strengthens the machine too much.

The machine, like the Almighty, needs not the assistance of human inventions and legislation. We need laws to strengthen the hands of the people, rather than the hands of the machine.

ONE ISSUE IN A NUTSHELL.

Senator Hoar, of Massachusetts, whose noble career has just closed, said:

"There is left on the statute book no trace of any Democratic legislation during the whole period of thirty-two years except the repeal of the laws intended to secure honest elections. The two administrations of President Cleveland are remembered by the business men and the laboring men of the country only as terrible nightmares. Whatever has been accomplished in this period, which seems to me the most brilliant period in legislative history of any country in the world, has been accomplished by the Republican party over Democratic opposition. The failure to secure honest national elections and the political and civil rights of the colored people is the failure of the Republican party and the success of its Democratic antagonist."

And yet Judge Parker in his letter of acceptance asks: "Shall our government stand for equal opportunity or for special privileges?"

THE PATHOS OF THE PULPIT.

The refusal of some of the Albany Methodists to receive their pastor is worthy of comment.

The main ground that he is not the man of their choice and that they were not consulted will not be regarded as valid with us.

The power of appointment lies with the bishop, and while there is sometimes influence brought to bear to shape results, he is authority.

People who subscribe to a form of church organization, like members of a political party, are compelled to yield obedience to the machine.

The other argument, that Dr. Summerville is an old man, and that the Albany church desires a younger and more strenuous minister, is weak.

If age leads weight and consideration in any field of this world's activity, it should be especially esteemed in the spiritual adviser.

The Saviour came on earth and appointed his followers and co-laborers in the vineyard especially to fight the ravages of time.

Disease and the infirmities of old age were to be healed and all things to be made young and new.

The Christian church should be the last to discriminate against age in the pulpit. Honor the aged is the first precept of religion.

What can be more pathetic than a congregation turning aside from a venerable and faithful follower of Christ and his ministry on earth?

THE TOM RICHARDSON PLAN.

Under the Tom Richardson plan of securing immigration half a million people were added to the population of Louisiana and Texas in two years.

This plan has been endorsed by the State Development League. The city of Salem and the surrounding country will benefit by it. What are you doing to help the program?

Salem business men are doing their share towards raising the funds for this purpose. But others are to be benefited on a large scale. All nurseries, dairies, vegetable gardens and fruit growers will be benefited.

A plan should be adopted by the Commercial Club to secure the financial assistance and co-operation of all these interests. Colleges and churches will also be benefited, and should help. Let us all pull together for one million population in Oregon.

NEEDS NO LAW.

Oregonians: Republicans in Salem adopted the direct primary plan in making nominations of candidates for municipal offices last year, and the plan worked so satisfactorily that it will probably be tried again this year, notwithstanding it will be impossible to proceed under the state direct primary law. When people find that a system is a good one they do not need to be compelled to adopt it.

A Woodburn dispatch says: Walter L. Toozie, who seems to be the only one buying hops here, has set the pace at 30 cents a pound, taking only the choicest to be had. He has purchased within the past four days the following:

From Joseph Aicher, 92 bales at 30 cents; from Nick Serros, 30 bales at 29 cents; from P. J. Hanson, 20 bales at 29 1/2 cents; from Joe Adelman, Gervais, 55 bales at 30 cents; from Christian Zimmerman, Aurora, 30 bales at 30 cents; from M. Ferschweiler, 22 bales at 30 cents, and 13 bales of first growth at 28 cents, and the Collinson lot of 50 bales at 30 cents.

There are about 500 bales unsold in this immediate vicinity, and more than 1000 bales within seven or eight miles of Woodburn. A few are holding for better figures.

The required petition under the new local option amendment adopted by the ballots of the voters of Oregon at the last general election, was filed with County Clerk Zopher Agee Tuesday of this week, asking that the question of prohibition be submitted to the voters of Douglas county at the presidential election in November. The petition bears the signature of 6000 citizens residing in various parts of the county, the number being considerably in excess of the requisite 10 per cent of the legal voters of the county, as specified in the new law.—Plaindealer.
