

## PROMINENT LIBERTY FARMER DISAPPEARS

### J. M. Rumbaugh Left Home Wednesday Morning Without Apparent Cause

J. M. Rumbaugh, a prominent farmer living near Liberty, disappeared on Wednesday morning, and no trace of him can be found. It is feared that in a fit of temporary aberration of mind that he took his own life, or wandered into some secluded spot and died.

On Wednesday morning he was about the place as usual, but acted in a rather peculiar manner. He asked where his son Clyde was, and Mrs. Rumbaugh told him that he was at Salem attending the Capital Business college. They had previously arranged for him to spend the winter in Salem. She thought it was very strange in asking the question, but he afterwards appeared rational, and said that he was going over to the fruit dryer.

Mrs. Rumbaugh noticed that he did not go inside the building, but reclined

on the ground, and she at once went over to where he was. She asked him if he was sick, but he replied that he was just tired, and would be all right in a little while. A short time afterward he disappeared, and that is the last that has been seen or heard of him.

Mr. Rumbaugh is an old settler of Marion county, and is a prosperous farmer and fruit grower. He is about 65 years of age, and has a wife and two sons. Clyde, who contemplated attending school, returned to Liberty Thursday morning, and has been assisting in the search.

Several theories are advanced, but the most probable one is that he is suffering from sickness. An effort will be made to locate him, and the neighbors will form searching parties to assist in the work.

## COOS COUNTY MINE

### Is on Fire and Total Destruction May Result

Coquille City, Oct. 8.—The Beaver Hill coal mine is afire from top to bottom, and it is doubtful if anything short of total destruction can be averted. One million dollars is at stake.

At 7 o'clock yesterday morning there was a slight explosion caused by an electric spark of a motor on the sixth level. The motorman and bucker were slightly burned. Several sets of timber quickly caught fire as the result of the explosion. It was immediately seen that the mine was in serious danger, and it was at once bulkheaded and closed.

The Beaver Hill mine is owned by Spreckels Bros.' Company, of San Francisco. It is worth fully \$1,000,000, and is working what is considered one of the most valuable coal deposits on the Pacific coast.
