THE SALEM PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

This community is to be congratulated on having made a fair start towards having the best public schools in the state.

A full high school course has been established and the enrollment in the higher grades may reach nearly 200 this year.

That means that 200 young people will be carried along three years farther in the studies of the higher grades than formerly.

Two hundred young people will get free tuition in the preparatory work that hitherto had to be paid for by the parents in preparatory schools.

As a matter of fact, but a small proportion of the 200 would get the preparatory work because the parents could not afford to give it to them.

They would simply have dropped out of school and become competitors for employment in places of business. As a result of the higher grades they are given a chance to prepare for life at the public expense.

CHANGE THE STREET CAR SIGNS.

The Journal is going to suggest that the signs indicating the destination of the street cars be changed.

It is rather gruesome to see three street cars lined up, one labeled "Penitentiary," the other "Asylum" and the third "Cemetery."

This is not the fault of the street car company, but these terms have been used for many years.

The Penitentiary line cards could be labeled State Street. The Asylum line cards could be labeled Englewood. The Cemetery cars could be labeled Fairmount Park.

These are only suggestions to show how much pleasanter the effect would be upon the nerves and the minds of visitors and strangers.

The Commercial Club or the city council could take some action in this matter, and we have no doubt the street car corporation would cheerfully comply.

COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING TONIGHT.

Matters of the greatest importance to the city are up for discussion at the meeting of the Greater Salem Commercial Club tonight.

The condition of the west bank of the river will be taken up once more for action.

The State Development League work will be presented, as far as it has been promoted.

The question of the revenues of the city as affected by the coming election will be considered.

Salem can be made a city of twenty thousand in two years, if the people who are here now will awaken to their opportunities.

THREE BIG LAWSUITS.

At the present term of Judge Barnett's court there are three important suits to be tried.

First is the suit to recover money paid for base land to General Odell by Salem parties.

General Odell holds the money subject to the rulings of the land department and the decisions of the courts.

Another suit of public interest is the case of James Penland versus the S. P. Co., for the death of Mrs. Penland, for \$5000.

The third suit of public interest is that of the Salem chief of police versus the Capital Journal publishers, for \$5000.

It is seldom three suits of such great interest to the public are on the docket in one week, and to be tried in succession.

The Scandia Bulletin, of Seattle, 812 Second avenue, has been received, and we welcome such a publication as a means of bringing together these important elements of the Pacific coast in closer touch. WATSON
ROASTS
PARKER

Chicago, Oct. 11.—Thomas E. Watson, nominee of the People's party for President, spoke here last night to an audience which filled the Princess rink to overflowing. The policies of both Republican and Democratic parties were scored bitterly by Mr. Watson, and his declarations were received with enthusiasm. Mr. Watson spoke in part as follows:

"This campaign, to a greater extent than any we have ever known, is a campaign of humbug, so far as Parker is concerned. We have a campaign against trusts, financed by the Standard Oil Company; a campaign against extravagance, led by men who when entrusted with power in 1892 on a platform pledging them to rigorous economy, increased the public debt \$262,000,000 in time of peace without having bought Panama or the Philippines or anything else except the paper parchment upon which they printed the bonds; a campaign against militarism, inaugurated by the men who lent the United States army to the Pullman Palace Car Company to quell a strike at the point of the bayonet; a campaign for tariff reform, led by men who opposed the income tax and who, when they had the power in 1892 to reform the tariff, deputized a Democratic cabinet member to write the sugar schedule just Havemeyer directed; a prohibition campaign, led by the whisky trust; a labor movement led by Bell and Frick and Penbody. A crusade against gambling led by Richard Canfield, of New York and Tom Taggart, of Indiana, would not be more of a self-evident and brazen attempt to deceive than this Parker campaign, which pretends to be against class legislation, and at the same time is led and cashed by such beneficiaries of class legislation as August Belmont, the Standard Oil Company and kindred corporation of the Wall street sort."
