

ERY SALOON IN SALEM WAS CLOSED

Other Lines of Business Remained as Usual---Wet Weather Caused Bad Colds

Salem was a virtuous city yesterday, at least that was the conclusion reached from a casual trip around town. Everything was quiet, and the only refreshments at other than the saloons. The town was in demand, but as one of the Journal reporters had a lame arm, he was compelled to forego the pleasure of supplying from the cup of the aqua.

Several hours at the typewriter keys produced a thirst, and out started the reporter in quest of an open house. His hands looked at him askance as he traversed alleys and byways adjoining well-known refreshment resorts. Knocked until his knuckles were cracked out, he met the mixologists rolling down the streets and implored, even begged to be allowed to "smile," but the efforts were in vain. He thought that they thought he did not have the price, and there he armed himself with a lead pipe and even offered to treat the saloonkeepers if they would only allow him to enter within the portals of their establishments, but he remained dry. It will take several days this time to "catch up" and get back into normal condition.

Obviously, however, Salem, as far as saloons were concerned, was a closed town. The candy stores were also the shooting galleries, cigar stands, restaurants, hotels, drug stores, postoffice, and even the drug stores. The past week has been very bad for colds and the drug stores were kept busy yesterday selling cough medicine and throat tonic. Several drug stores were favorite meeting places for the sick and ailed, who seemed to be afraid that they would be seized with violent coughing spells on the street and their friends might think that they had contracted. From late reports it is not expected that the fatalities will be from the epidemic of influenza, but made its appearance yesterday. "Bill Anderson was loitering around in front of the creamery looking for a drink of buttermilk. He was handed a friend a piece of

money and told him to go down to the Anderson headquarters and buy a drink. The friend was inclined to resent the insinuation at first, but enjoyed the joke when it dawned on him. Cornoyer had a sign over his bar on Saturday evening, which read: "Get your prescription filled today; we will be closed tomorrow." A picture of a flask ornamented one side of the sign.

The saloonmen and their employees amused themselves during the day by watching the thirsty strangers who were not aware of the arrangements, trying vainly the various doors of the places. They enjoyed the rest as well as anybody.

The saloon closing is the result of a movement started last week and every saloonman in the city favored the plan. It is voluntarily on their part and will be a permanent arrangement.

Sunday observance began at midnight sharp Saturday night, and all the saloons were cleared of their customers. By no contrivance could any liquor be procured at any of them. Some parties who patronized the Eckstein restaurant tired themselves out trying to get bottled beer, but were refused. The same was true at the Willamette hotel clubroom. No liquors were served at any place unless it was the Illihee club or the drug stores. The drug stores only keep open at certain hours on Sunday and it was not learned that they had any more trade than usual. A fire alarm was sounded Sunday evening between 7 and 8 o'clock and crowds poured out of the cigar stores--mostly young men who seemed to have no other congenial place to go and spend the evening. There must have been several hundred at the various cigar stores and they seemed to be enjoying themselves in a quiet and orderly manner at cards and other games.

It developed today that the Chinese gin joints were running in full blast, and many of the "400" lubricated their dry bearings at the resorts named. The fan-tan games were also wide open throughout the day and night, and were liberally patronized.

American Library Association.

St. Louis, Oct. 17.--Probably the most notable of the several conventions to be held in the world's fair city this week is the annual meeting of the American Library Association, which began today with a large and representative attendance. Herbert Putnam, librarian of the congressional library at Washington, will preside over the sessions, which will continue until the end of the week. Among the practical topics scheduled for discussion are: "State Aid to Libraries," "The Library and the School," "Women in Library Work," "Methods in Cataloging," "Classification and Annotation," and "The Best Reading for the Largest Number at the Least Cost." During the week, in connection with the meeting of the national association, the state library associations of Kansas, Missouri, New York and Iowa will hold their annual conventions.

Illinois Women's Club.

Danville, Ill., Oct. 17.--Danville has thrown her gates wide open in welcome to the several hundred delegates who are gathering from all parts of the state for the annual convention of the Illinois State Federation of Women's Clubs. The convention promises to be notable for the prominence, as well as the number of its participants. Mrs. Decker, the national president, Lorado Taft and other persons of prominence will address the convention, which will be in session three days. Mrs. E. M. Bacon, of Decatur, retires as president of the state federation. Mrs. Henry Solomon, of Chicago, is prominently mentioned as her successor. The local clubs have prepared elaborate entertainment for the visitors.

Brotherhood of the Union.

Washington, Oct. 17.--The Supreme Circle of the Brotherhood of the Union, a patriotic, fraternal and beneficial organization founded in 1847 by George Lippard, the Philadelphia novelist, began its annual convention in Washington today and will remain in session until Friday. Delegates are present from a number of states. Measures looking to the restriction of foreign immigration will be a prominent feature of the discussions.

Springfield, Ill., Oct. 17.--Illinois Baptists have rallied here in force for the sixteenth annual session of the Baptist General Association of the state. The meeting opens in the Central Baptist church this evening, with an address of welcome by Judge J. Otis Humphrey, to be followed by the annual sermon, which will be delivered by Rev. George H. Simmons, D. D., of Peoria. The sessions of the convention will continue until Friday.
