VOTERS WILL RALLY

Republicans Expect to Have a Rousing Meeting During Next Two Weeks

The Republicans of Marion county will hold a grand rally sometime during the next two weeks, at which time it is expected to have some of the most prominent speakers in the state address the voters from the standpoint of sound money, protection and expansion.

State Committeeman Hal D. Patton has been in correspondence with the state committee, and is assured that at least one noted orator will be furnished the Marion county people, and he will expend his energies to make the crowd a record-breaker in local political gatherings.

The Young Men's Republican Club, the Roosevelt Club and the First Voters' Club will assist in the work. The last named club will complete their organization at the meeting Friday night, and it is expected that a large number of twenty-ones will enroll their names for Roosevelt, Fairbanks and progress.

Prohibitionists Were Slow.

Though petitions were circulated and filed for a vote on prohibition under the new local option law, the prospects are no vote will be taken at the coming election. The purpose of the petitioners has miscarried. The law provides that after the petition is filed the county court shall order an election. The petition in this case was filed after the October term of court had adjourned. It will be too late to make the order when the court again convenes in regular session. For the purpose of ordering such election, County Judge Coad holds he does not constitute "the court." He further holds that he is not authorized to convene a commissioners' court for that special purpose. So there will be no order made. County Clerk Smith has consulted the district attorney relative to the clerk's duty in making up the ballot. The district attorney has advised that the clerk's duty is restricted to merely acting as clerk of the court and that he is not authorized to place on the official ballot what is not ordered by the court. This seems to bring to an end the effort to secure a vote on prohibition in Polk county this election.
