## CITY COUNCIL GRINDS

### New Electric Light Ordinance for the City

#### Old City Will Have Ten More Lights and the New Wards Will Have Fifteen

The new electric lighting ordinance was passed at a meeting of the city council Tuesday evening, providing for 60 lights at the old rate fixed by the Hayesed council, at \$1.50 per month for five years. This is the third contract of this kind the city has entered into in the history of electric lighting in this city.

The vote which upon this ordinance was passed stood as follows: Alderman Churchill, Crook, Downing, Hughes, Jacobs, Smith, Walker, Young, Nays—Bayne, Sims, Abent—Catlin, Germer, Hubbard.

Under the new ordinance 10 new lights will be erected in the four old wards of the city, and 15 in the new wards. The electric corporation today ordered the poles distributed for the lights in the new wards.

Alderman Sims introduced a resolution instructing the committee on lights to frame an ordinance for maximum water, light, gas and power to private consumers. Adopted.

On motion of Alderman Downing, the street commissioner was instructed to order all dedicated alleys opened.

After a few minor matters the council adjourned.

## MISUNDERSTANDING SETTLED

There has been an awkward misunderstanding about the school board meeting in the police court room of the city hall. There has been quite a demand by the public that meetings of the board should be held in a public place, and upon application to the city council, permission was granted the board to use this room. At the time of the last meeting it seemed that City Recorder Judah could not be reached by phone, or otherwise, to open the room, and as he was not authorized to give out a key for the use of the board, that body had to meet elsewhere last week. He has now, however, been authorized by Mayor Waters to give the school clerk a key, which will enable them to hold their meetings there at any time. This will settle the apparent difficulty and give the public the benefit of the wide open meetings.

#### Departure in Burial

The Eugene Guard, in writing up the funeral of the late Ira L. Campbell, says:

Instead the bottom of the grave was covered with fir boughs, while canvas upon which Ivy was plentifully fastened was drawn about the sides. The casket was lowered into its bed of evergreens then plentifully covered with boughs. There was no getting into the grave by the sexton or undertaker, with rattling boards to cover the box, then the kindly covering earth fell gently. There was none of that heart-breaking sound of stones falling upon loose boards, bringing to the bereaved perhaps the first complete realization of the finality of their loss.
