Gas and Oil.

Ed. Journal: Just once more, by your grace, I come briefly in the interests of fair play, and the general public. This time the subject shall be natural gas and oil. Beyond question no more promising undeveloped field for the production of these two important commodities lies out of doors anywhere than in this section of the Willamette valley. The proof of tremendous gas pressure is the presence of the finest quality of crude oil on the waters of scores of wells and springs throughout the country. The gas alone developed and controlled would solve the light and fuel problem for a generation to come. As to oil, no Ohio or Pennsylvania field ever made so fine a promise.

Why does not the work of development begin? Is there a bog in the woodpile? The Eastern dressed animal is not different from his Western brother. In the Ohio fields the people who owned the oil lands learned by experience to safeguard their own interests. Here are a few of the points they picked up. First, to lease their lands for only a brief time—six months or a year at the longest period. If at the expiration of that time production was not in progress—in other words if oil or gas, or both, were not being produced in paying quantities, the lease was void. An important item in each lease read: "This lease is not transferable." The owner of the leased land in no case receives less than one-sixth of the oil, 16 barrels of each 100 produced. In addition to this he often receives a bonus of \$20 or more per acre from the party taking the lease. The producer bears all the expense of drilling, storage, tanks, pipe lines and all other costs of producing and marketing the products of the wells. If there is gas in connection with the oil the owner of the land gets \$200 a year for each well, and all the gas necessary to light and heat his home. Sometimes a community of land holders form a company and hire a man who owns a drilling rig to sink a well for them. The drill owner bears all expenses and finishes the well for a dollar a foot, the company furnishing the casing. It is known that, barring accidents, the contractor clears 50 cents on each foot drilled. Talk of a well here costing \$3000. Would the freight on a drilling outfit sent from an Eastern supply house amount to \$1800? Let us have fair play, or eastern push and capital may teach us an important lesson. J. RIGDON.
