SACRED HEART ACADEMY

Celebrates Its Forty-Fifth Anniversary

Historical Event in the Conduct of This Historic Institution

The pupils of Sacred Heart Academy, in this city, were given a holiday on Friday. It is an important day in the history of the order of Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, who own and control the school. Forty-five years ago today—October 21, 1859—the first delegation of these pious sisters—12 in number—arrived in Oregon from Montreal, having made the voyage by the way of the Isthmus of Panama, with many trials and dangers.

It was through the request of Archbishop F. N. Blanchet, the pioneer prelate of the great Pacific Northwest, that the brave little company of teaching sisters was procured, and he accompanied them on their voyage to the "Far West." In the same vessel with them General Winfield Scott, then an idolized hero, was also a passenger, and in their annals of the journey the sisters record with great gratitude his remarkable kindness and consideration to them. An account of the landing at Portland, written a few years ago, closes with this paragraph:

"An expectant throng of spectators lined one of Portland's wharfs on the morning of October 21, 1859. The arrival of General Scott and his staff was an auspicious event that called forth hundreds, in whose hearts the great American general held his place as an ideal hero; the return of Oregon's apostolic prelate to his flock was joyously welcomed by the few devoted priests and the pioneer Catholics of Portland, whose gratitude was boundless on beholding his efforts to procure an educational sisterhood rewarded."

The 12 sisters composing the devoted and unselfish band were Sisters Mary Alphonse, Mary of Mercy, Mary Margaret, Marie de la Visitation, Francis Xavier, Mary du Calvaire, Febronia, Florence Perpetua, Arsenius, Julia and Agatha, and a remarkable tribute to the climate of Oregon is that after 45 years of increasing and laborious toil, six of these, or 50 per cent, are still alive and in active service, viz: Sisters M. Margaret, Francis Xavier, Perpetua Agatha and Febronia, the last named being one of those in charge of Sacred Heart Academy in this city, the others being at St. Mary's college and academy in Portland.

Their coming to Portland found very cheerful surroundings. Where now stands the magnificent brick structure between Fourth, Fifth, Market and Mill streets, there was a small wooden building with none of the comforts of life. Their first nights were spent with their satchels for pillows and the available contents of satchels for bed covering. The inconveniences, and, one might say, hardships, of the early days for them were many, but they were consecrated to a cause, and they bore all with patience.

Four years later—in 1863—a few of those sisters came to Salem and started their first school in the old Masonic hall at the corner of Chemeketa and church streets, where Dr. Richardson's residence now stands, later securing the property which they now occupy, and where they have built up an education institution that is a source of pride to this city.

At the Portland college and academy there is also a holiday today and a celebration of the anniversary, in which Sister Febronia has joined her five remaining fellow-pioneers in looking back over this long lifetime and rehearsing the scenes and experiences incident thereto. It certainly forms an event in Oregon history well worth remembering and honoring.
