THE SIZE OF PROF. DREW.

Let us be just to Prof. Drew. He is a man of good intentions, a man of some education and ability, doing what he thinks is right, but congenitally narrow, bigoted and puritanical. He is not a man who takes any interest in the common every-day affairs of this world. Yet he wants to control public policies of the city. He lives in a rarefied air of theoretical asceticism.

We have never seen him at a political meeting, at a meeting of the Commercial club, at a school meeting, goods roads meeting, or any meeting for the advancement of the city or country.

He is not known as a property owner, a taxpayer, a man who ever serves on any committee, or ever contributed a dollar to any subscription list for any purpose in this community.

His one hobby is Prohibition and Sunday closing, and in this he has no toleration of anyone who differs with him. All are bad and corrupt and unholy who differ from him.

His radicalism pleases a few extremists who would even boycott the business man who will not promise to vote for local option, when he knows that it is Prohibition he is after. That is Drew at full length.

NOT APPRECIATED.

One thing a conscientious newspaper does is not appreciated—refusing to publish attacks on private citizens.

There is scarcely a week passes that this office does not receive communications against this man or that woman.

Some of these articles are signed, and some are not. Some are about people in the school, city, or county, or state employ.

Some of these communications attack persons who are not friends of The Journal, or politically opposed to it. They are treated like others.

Unless a communication is of some interest to the general public, and written for some public purpose, it has no place in a decent newspaper.

The temptation to avenge yourself on your enemy is sometimes great—even for a newspaper man.

But in the light of higher truth, we can have no enemies but of our own creation, and hence not really enemies.

This service of newspapers and rejection of articles calculated to roast some person in print, is not fully appreciated. With the Psalmist, newspaper publishers should say: "Vengeance is mine, saith the Lord. I will repay."

FACTS, NOT FICTION.

The Daily Capital Journal, of Salem, has the following to say about the vote on prohibition:

"Have this county carried for prohibition, and it will advertise Marion county to the world as a place of unlicensed blind pigs, and drunken carousals by boys in barns. LIBRARY OF CONGRESS.

The congressional library at Washington, D. C., has cost millions and has millions of books piled up mostly unused.

This office is now deluged with catalogues of the contents of that library classified by topics, that no one has time even to read the lists.

In this age of newspapers and periodicals and cheap books, the average man or woman has more of these things than can be read to advantage.

If the whole library at Washington, D. C., were burned today, not a single person in Oregon, or any other state, would feel they had lost anything.

If the congressional library could be divided up into a thousand small libraries and scattered about the country it might be of some use to the people.

The furnishing of free libraries for the professional classes and office-holding classes, who are best able to buy their own books, is a rank imposition.

Libraries are all right. But the present way of storing them away, a collection of mummies, is all wrong. Let the people get at them.

One of the most enthusiastic men at the convention to send a Marion county exhibit to the Lewis and Clark fair was Uncle Jesse Settlement, of Woodburn. His ideas are broad and practical, and when it was proposed to buy some lady's private collection of canned goods, put up in Mason quart jars, Uncle Jesse said that was all right, but the exhibit for the largest agricultural county in the state must be on a little different from the "pantry store's" scale. He would make a fight for an exhibit in proportion to the world's fair, and from the tenor of his remarks and the character of the men selected by the county court, there will for once be an exhibit that is on a scale commensurate with our dimensions.

The Oregon hop crop, worth five million dollars this year, is imperiled by every vote cast for Prohibition at the coming election. If you are heart and soul a Prohibitionist as a matter of principle, and believe in putting the Prohibition party in power, no one can blame you for voting for it. But if you are not a member of the Prohibition party, how can you consistently vote to adopt a prohibition policy when every official of every other party in power in the city, county and state does not believe in enforcing Prohibition laws?

The Journal fought to put Marion county and the City of Salem on a cash basis, and it was done. The Journal fought for the popular loan manner of taking up public debt, and it was done. The Journal fought for the establishment of a high school at Salem, and it was done. The Journal now fights for permanent street improvements, and it will be done if it takes all summer.
