THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

North Pacific Unitarian Conference in Session This Week

The third annual meeting of the North Pacific Unitarian conference opened last evening at Unity church, in this city, with 23 delegates from the various churches of the state, and 10 delegates from Salem in attendance.

The following officers presided: William Woodward, president; Hon. E. L. Smith, vice-president; Ralph W. Wilbur, recording secretary; W. G. Elliott, Jr., recording secretary; Rev. George Crosswell Cressy, D. D., Joseph Shippen, Esq., Mrs. W. M. Stewart and Mrs. C. S. Hamilton.

The meeting was opened at 7:45 p. m., with the conference sermon, "The Place and Work of the Church in Modern Life," by Rev. Earl M. Wilber, dean of the Unitarian Divinity School, Oakland, California, after which the conference adjourned until 9 o'clock.

Reports from churches, women's societies and other organizations, and the report of the corresponding secretary, Rev. W. G. Elliott, Jr., were received.

At 11 a. m. an address, "The Young People's Religious Union" was delivered by Miss Ellen S. Elliott, of Portland, Oregon.

At 11:45 a. m. devotional services were held, and at 12 o'clock dinner was served in Channing hall.

At 2 p. m. the meeting was reopened with the reading of the greetings from absent ministers, which was followed at 2:30 by discussion upon the importance of thorough instruction in the history and fundamental principles of our faith by Dr. Geo. Crosswell Cressy and Dean Wilbur.

This closing the afternoon's work, the meeting was adjourned until 7:45 p. m.

ELECTION FOREGONE CONCLUSION

General Grosvenor Gives His Estimate of Roosevelt's Strength

Athens, Ohio, Oct. 26.—General Charles H. Grosvenor has given out his figures on election. He predicts that Roosevelt and Fairbanks will carry New York, West Virginia, Indiana, Wisconsin, but classes Montana and Maryland as doubtful, with the chance favoring Parker. According to his figures, Roosevelt will have 314 votes in the electoral college, and says there will be a good working Republican majority in the house.
