SMOOTH INDIAN FORGER

Tacoma, Oct. 28.—H. C. Taylor, a Payallup Indian, is under arrest for forgery. When arrested, Taylor had in his possession bogus deposit slips for \$24,100 and for \$21,000 on local banks.

Taylor is also charged with passing a forged check for \$112 on the Pacific National bank, signing the name of Col. J. Anderson to it.

In addition to being a most adept penman, Taylor is a remarkably intelligent Indian. He has already served two terms in the state penitentiary, both of which was for forgery. A little more than four years ago he was arrested at Spokane and a strong case of forgery made against him which resulted in a four-year sentence at Walla Walla. At that time he had just completed a two-year term for forgeries committed here.

Taylor has a romantic episode in his history. Years ago he met and married a white woman at Enunlaw.

She had been a devoted wife up to the time of making Taylor's acquaintance. Her infatuation was such that she left her husband and her home and children and went with the Indian. Her husband secured a divorce. The property belonging to them was apportioned and the woman obtained \$12,300 as her share. This she spent on Taylor and the two lived in a princely manner. The two have lived about Tacoma and have spent the money with a lavish hand. Recently, however, the money began to dwindle.

Had Exciting Experience.

Bangor, Me., Oct. 28.—The most remarkable adventure of the season in the Maine woods was that which befell Abbiel Nelson, of Skowhegan, Saturday, near the forks of the Kennebec. Nelson was carried three miles through the woods on the horns of an infuriated bull moose, was nearly drowned in a lake, which the moose swam, and then swung on the animal's horns while it did battle with another moose. Nelson survived the experience.

He had climbed a tree to escape from the animal, but a limb broke and he alighted on the moose's horns, his clothing becoming caught on them. He was rendered unconscious by the fall, but he revived when the moose swam the lake. When the other bull appeared and the fight began Nelson was still fastened to the moose's horns. He was banged about until nearly killed. Finally his clothing gave way and he was tossed aside. The two moose fought to a finish and the survivor was so weak that Nelson was able to cut its throat.

Teachers Meet at Fairmont.

Fairmont, Minn., Oct. 28.—The teachers of the Southern Minnesota Teachers' association are holding their eighteenth annual meeting in this city. The presiding officer is President Van Aiken, of Parker college, Winnebago City. Other prominent participants include Dr. J. S. Young, of Mankato normal school; Superintendent A. C. Tibbette, of Blue Earth; Superintendent John Sander, of St. Peter; Superintendent Race, of Redwood county, and G. A. Franklin, of Faribault. The program covers two days and provides for a number of sectional conferences in addition to the general sessions.

WOOD FOR STATE INSTITUTIONS.

Sealed bids will be received at the Executive Office, State Capitol, Salem, until 2 o'clock p. m., November 10, 1904, for furnishing wood for the several state institutions located at or near Salem, as follows:

Insane Asylum, main building, 4500 cords first growth fir.

Insane Asylum, Cottage Farm, 1500 cords first growth fir.

Penitentiary, 700 cords first growth fir; 700 cords second growth; 100 cords oak.

Reform School, 475 cords first growth fir; 450 cords second growth.

Deaf Mute School, 350 cords first growth fir; 75 cords split ash or oak.

Blind School, 80 cords first growth fir; 10 cords oak.

Capitol Building, 400 cords first growth fir; 20 cords oak.

Bids on second growth fir wood for all or any part of the above will also be entertained.

Bids will be received for all or any part. Cordwood must be cut while green, from sound timber, four feet long, reasonably straight, well seasoned, delivered as designated, at or near the several institutions, closely corded without bulkheads. Delivery may begin May 1st, and must be completed by October 1, 1905.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check, payable to the Clerk, or cash equal to 25 cents per cord, to be forfeited to the state as damages, in case the bidder receiving the award shall fail to execute a contract to deliver the wood and furnish satisfactory bond. Successful bidders will be required within ten days after notification of acceptance of bid to enter into a contract and furnish a satisfactory bond. Bidders should be careful to state in their bids the name of the institution and the kind and number of cords of wood to be furnished. Bids must be in sealed envelopes, endorse "Proposal for Wood," and addressed to the undersigned. Any further information may be had of the undersigned. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids or any part of a bid, and to waive defects in any bid, if it be deemed to the interest of the state to do so.
