OPINIONS OF GREAT LEADERS

The following expressions of opinion made by men of national reputation who have lived and suffered in prohibition states will give an accurate idea of the dangers of this kind of legislation.

Governor Boies, writing of prohibition in Iowa in 1890, said: "I feel certain that more distilled spirits are used as a beverage in Iowa under the present law than ever have been before would be under a liquor system. I am equally certain that the spirits used are of the worst kind. There is no doubt that the prohibition has failed to lessen the evils of intemperance, has retarded immigration into and hastened emigration from the state and consequently drained the state of immense sums of money sent to other states for the purchase of liquors. I do not believe that crime has been diminished or criminal expenses by this law, or that criminal convictions are less than before this law went into effect. Instead thereof if we count prosecutions, convictions and expenses incurred under this law, they have been greatly increased."

Rev. T. J. Mackay, Council Bluffs, Iowa, says: "After several years of trial of prohibition in this city the law has proved a miserable farce. The county has been put to an immense amount of trouble and expense, all to no purpose."

"I do not believe that the open saloon is as dangerous to the morals of the rising generation as the club rooms and private drinking habits which prohibition creates. The worst trap for incautious youths is the one which is disguised and hidden under the pleasing form of club life and amid the secrecy ever dear to the youthful mind. We can guard our youth from a danger which we see and know, but against these hidden foes, which appeal so powerfully to certain instincts in the human heart, who can protect them?"

Ex-Secretary Russell A. Alger, Michigan, says: "You can't talk prohibition in Michigan, for we have tried it and know what a dire failure it is. When we had prohibition, the state was flooded with smuggled beer and whisky, and it was impossible for us to prevent it. We now license the saloons, and while there is no more liquor drunk than there was during the reign of prohibition, we derive an enormous revenue from the traffic, besides preventing liquors from being smuggled into the state and sold illegally, as it puts the saloon men to guarding each other. I have always considered prohibition a failure, and don't believe it can ever be made effectual."

Governor Rodwell, Maine, says: "I am trying to enforce prohibition in Maine, but I find it the biggest job I ever undertook."

Ex-Governor Rice, Massachusetts, says: "I do not favor the prohibitory amendment for the reason that I am in favor of the most efficient means for suppressing drunkenness; and I believe the adoption of such an amendment would lead to an increase of drunkenness. Whatever may have been the effect elsewhere, prohibition has not been a success in Massachusetts."

"I recognize the sincerity and zeal for good which inspires many of the advocates of prohibition; but my own opinion, reinforced by observation and experience, is that prohibition in Massachusetts has not been, and will not be, a means of diminishing drunkenness."

Ex-Governor Gardner, Massachusetts, says: "The result of the former prohibitory law—which, by the way, I signed while chief magistrate—was so unsatisfactory in its result that it was repealed by decisive majorities in a succeeding legislature, and does not encourage the re-enactment of similar provisions."

Ex-Governor Robinson, Kansas, says: "No progress in temperance reform ever resulted from prohibition, or ever will. All the progress that has been made from the time when the use of intoxicating drinks was well nigh universal to the time when not one-fourth of the people resort to them has been made outside of prohibition. In every attempt at legal prohibition the temperance cause has suffered."
